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
FOREWORD

This Final Report presents the results of the 2007 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS). It presents national and regional tables on selected non-income poverty indicators. It describes the profiles of families who belong to the bottom 30 percent income stratum and upper 70 percent income stratum, in terms of their demographic characteristics, health status, education, economic characteristics, housing, water and sanitation, and other information that can be used for the assessment of their living conditions.

APIS is a nationwide survey designed to provide non-income indicators of poverty. It is conducted annually except during the years when the Family Income and Expenditures Survey is conducted. The 2007 APIS is the fifth in a series of poverty indicators surveys conducted nationwide.

This publication can be used by policy makers and program implementers in their planning, assessment and evaluation of the various programs designed to reduce poverty incidence in the country. It can also be used by researchers interested in analyzing the poverty situation in the Philippines using non-income indicators.

The National Statistics Office (NSO) wishes to extend the sincerest gratitude to everyone who contributed to the successful completion of the 2007 APIS especially the respondents for their cooperation and for spending their valuable time answering the APIS questionnaire, and the various NSO employees who untiringly carried out the various activities of the survey, from the preparatory phase to the post-enumeration phase.

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Background

The 2007 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS) is conducted by the National Statistics Office (NSO) as a rider to the July 2007 Labor Force Survey (LFS). The 2007 APIS is the fifth in the series of annual poverty indicators surveys conducted nationwide. Since 1998, APIS has been conducted during the years when the Family Income and Expenditures Survey (FIES) is not conducted, except in 2001 and 2005 due to budgetary constraints.

Objectives of the Survey

The APIS is a nationwide survey designed to provide non-income indicators related to poverty at the national and regional levels. It is designed to gather data on the socio-economic profile of families and other information that are related to their living conditions. Specifically, it generates indicators which are correlated with poverty, such as indicators regarding the ownership or possession of house and lot, the types of the materials of the roofs and walls of their housing units, their access to safe water, the types of toilet facility they use in their homes, and presence of family members of specified characteristics such as children 6-12 years old enrolled in elementary, children 13-16 years old enrolled in high school, members 18 years old and over gainfully employed, working children 5-17 years old and family members with membership in any health, life and/or pre-need insurance system.

Sampling Design

The 2007 APIS is a sample survey designed to provide data representative of the country and its 17 administrative regions. The survey's sample design helps ensure this representativeness. The 2007 APIS used the new master sample created for household surveys on the basis of the 2000 Census of Population and Housing (2000 CPH results). The survey used four replicates of the master sample. For each region (domain) and stratum, a three-stage sampling scheme was used: the selection of primary sampling units (PSUs) for the first stage, of sample enumeration areas (EAs) for the second stage, and of sample housing units for the third stage. PSUs within a region were stratified based on the proportion of households living in housing units made of strong materials, proportion of households in the barangay engaged in agricultural activities and per capita income of the city/municipality.

Background

As earlier mentioned, a three-stage sampling design was used in each stratum within a region. In the first stage, primary sampling units (PSUs) were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 Census. PSUs consisted of a barangay or a group of contiguous barangays. In the second stage, in each sampled PSU, EAs were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 Census. An EA is defined as an area with discernable boundaries consisting of approximately 350 contiguous households. In the third stage, from each sampled EA, housing units were selected using systematic sampling. For operational considerations, at most 30 housing units were selected per sample EA. All households in sample housing units were interviewed except for sample housing units with more than three households. In such a housing unit, three households were randomly selected with equal probability.

The 2007 APIS was conducted simultaneously with the July 2007 Labor Force Survey (LFS). All sample households of the July 2007 LFS were interviewed for the 2007 APIS. Only household members related to the household head by blood, marriage or adoption were considered as members of the sample household in APIS. Family members of the household head who are working abroad were excluded.

The results presented in this report are weighted to ensure that the data are representative of the population of the Philippines and its regions. Sampling weights, or expansion factors, were applied to the data obtained from sample households in order to derive estimates for the larger population from which the sample households were selected for the purpose of survey interviewing. The weights or expansion factors applied to each sample household reflected the probability of the households being selected for the survey sample. More specifically, the basic sampling weights assigned were equal to the inverse of the joint probability of selection in the three stages of sample selection. Since the sample was self-weighting within regions (domains) or strata, each household in a particular stratum received the same weight, or raising factor.

The weights adjustment factor takes into account the sample EAs which were not enumerated and households which were not interviewed. The product of the basic weights and weights adjustment factor was used to obtain the preliminary weighted estimates of the total number of families.

In order to make the weighted estimate of the total number of families consistent with the estimated number of families as of July 2007, a final weight adjustment factor was used. The estimated number of families by province as of July 2007 was derived using 2000 Census-based population projection for the province divided by the average household size of the province based on the 2000 CPH. In each province, the final weight adjustment is equal to the ratio of the estimated number of families as of July 2007 to the preliminary weighted estimate of the total number of families from the 2007 APIS data.

Response Rate

Of the 43,107 eligible sample households for the 2007 APIS, 40,239 were successfully interviewed. This translated to a response rate of 93.3 percent at the national level. Households which were not interviewed either refused to be interviewed or were not available or were away during the enumeration period.

Limitations of the Data

Data gathered from APIS are results of a sample survey and are therefore subject to sampling variations, that is, sampling errors are expected since the data are not obtained through complete enumeration or census.

The survey covered a national sample of households deemed sufficient to provide estimates about the population at the national and regional levels only. Hence, tabulations and cross-tabulations of variables at lower geographic levels such as provincial and municipal levels are not generated since these may not be statistically reliable.

Survey estimates may also be affected by non-sampling errors such as deliberate under or over reporting of income and expenditures or reluctance on the part of the respondents to reveal their true levels of income/expenditures.

Moreover, considering that both cash and non-cash expenditures and income are gathered in APIS, valuation of non-cash income and expenditures may pose some problems. The instructions are to use market prices prevailing in the locality for goods and services received as gifts, and farm gate prices for goods consumed from own production. However, market prices may not be available for all items in the locality or market prices/farm gate prices may be highly variable for different localities.

Although APIS is a rider to the LFS, matching during data processing was limited to the demographic characteristics of household heads. Therefore, users should be prompted by the resulting variations of estimates from the two data sets.

Further, data users attempting to match 2007 APIS and the 2006 FIES should take note of the differences in the reference period. The 2006 FIES was conducted in two visits covering the periods January to June 2006 and July to December 2006 while 2007 APIS covered January to June 2007.

Background

Survey Questionnaire

The 2007 APIS questionnaire (APIS Form 1) contains the following sections:

Though questions on 'Changes in Welfare' were dropped and some items were modified for the 2007 APIS, most of the questions/items in the previous APISs were retained as requested by data users. Nine items were added in order to generate data that will be more useful in assessing the poverty situation in the country. The new questionnaire for the 2007 contains the abridged version of the module on entrepreneurial activities resulting to the reduction of the number of pages from 24 to 12. The decision to use the abridged version was based on the results of the study entitled "Redesigning APIS as a Poverty Monitoring Tool" undertaken by the Demographic and Social Statistics Division in 2006. The redesigned questionnaire produced results which are not statistically different from results based on the original design in 2004. The use of the redesigned questionnaire is also cost-efficient.

A round table discussion was held for the 2007 APIS before the conduct of the pretest. The redesigned APIS questionnaire based from the project's output was presented. It was agreed upon during this meeting to adopt the redesigned APIS for this round of APIS, with the addition of item on 'Hunger'.

The description or intention of each section of the 2007 APIS questionnaire is presented below.

Identification and Other Information – contains information about the geographic identification (region, province, city/municipality and barangay, EA code, sample housing serial number and household control number), design codes (replicate, stratum, PSU No., rotation group and number of households in the housing unit) and result of visit to the sample housing unit/household.

Demographic Characteristics – obtains the demographic characteristics of each family member such as relationship to the family head, sex, age and marital status.

Health Status – obtains information on whether illnesses and/or injuries experienced by the family are work-related or not and the type of health facilities that they visited or consulted in case of illnesses and/or injuries or anything pertaining to their family's health. It also includes question on the action taken by the family member when he got sick.

Schooling Status and Highest Grade Completed – determines whether a family member aged 3 to 24 years is currently attending formal school, and if so, the grade or year level the member is currently attending. If the member is not currently attending school, then the reason for not doing so is also asked. It also determines the educational attainment of the family members 5 years old and over.

Economic Characteristics – obtains information on the employment status of each family member 5 years old and over. It also includes questions on occupation and business engaged in by the household member during the past six months, and the salaries and wages from employment of each working family member.

Housing, Water and Sanitation – obtains information that relates to housing characteristics and household conveniences/amenities owned by the family. The main source of water supply and kind of toilet facility used were also asked.

Other Relevant Information – determines if any member of the family is a member of any health, life and/or pre-need insurance system, if any member of the family is aware of any government's program on affordable drugs/medicines, if any member of the family is a recipient of any scholarship grant from any government program or any private individual/organization, if any member of the family is aware of any lending institution or private individual whose business is lending money with interest, and if any member of the family availed of any loan, where was the loan availed of, and where did the money use in the past six months.

Hunger – determines if any member of the family experienced hunger in the past 3 months because he/she did not have anything to eat.

Family Sustenance and Entrepreneurial Activities – determines if any member of the family is engaged as operator or self-employed in any agricultural or non-agricultural family-operated activities. This section asks for the total net income, value consumed and value given away as gifts of the products derived/produced from such activity.

Other Sources of Income – obtains information on other sources of family income not derived from work.

Background

Other Receipts – obtains information on the sources of non-income receipts of families, that is, those that do not come from earnings, property income and gifts received.

Family Expenditures – determines the expenses made by the family purely for family members' personal consumption.

Concepts and Definitions

Bottom 30% – In descending order of the family per capita income, the bottom 30% refers to the bottom 30 percent of the total families in the income distribution. This grouping of families was used as a proxy for those falling below the poverty line.

Upper 70% – In descending order of the family per capita income, the upper 70% refers to the upper 70 percent of the total families in the income distribution. It is the complement of the bottom 30 percent.

Respondent – Knowledgeable member of the sample family who can provide accurate answers to most of the questions in the survey.

Family – Aggregate of persons bound by ties of kinship, who live together under the same roof and eat together or share in common the family food. For the purpose of this survey, a household can be classified as a nuclear family, extended family or a single person family. For a household comprising of members who are not related with each other by blood, marriage or adoption, only the head of the household is considered. This case is a single person family.

Family head - An adult member of the family who is responsible for the care and organization of the family or who is regarded as such by the members of the family.

Highest educational attainment - The highest grade or year completed in school, college or university.

Work - Any activity of a person done for pay, profit or without pay on family farm or enterprise or an activity done by a farm operator or member of his family on another's farm on "exchange labor" arrangement. In addition, any activity that a person does during the reference period in relation to minor activities such as home gardening, raising of crops/fruits, raising hogs/poultry, fishing, etc. for home consumption and manufacturing for home use are also considered as work.

Building - Any structure built, designed or intended for the enclosure, shelter or protection of any person, animal or property. It consists of one or more rooms and/or other spaces, covered by a roof, and usually enclosed within external walls or with common dividing walls with adjacent buildings, which usually extend from the foundation to the roof.

Housing unit - A structurally separate and independent place of abode which, by the way it has been constructed, converted, or arranged, is intended for habitation by one or more households. Structures or parts of structures which are not intended for habitation, such as commercial, industrial, and agricultural buildings, or natural and man-made shelters such as caves, boats, abandoned trucks, culverts, etc., but are used as living quarters by households, are also considered as housing units.

Floor area - The area enclosed by the exterior walls of the housing unit. In case of several floors, the area of the housing unit is the sum of areas of all floors.

Class of worker - The relationship of the worker to the establishment in which he/she works.

The classes of workers are:

1. Worked for private household – a person who worked in a private household for pay, in cash or in kind. Examples are domestic helper, household cook, gardener, family driver, etc.
2. Worked for private establishment – a person who worked in a private establishment for pay, in cash or in kind. This class includes not only persons working for private industry but also those working for a religious group (priest, acolyte, missionary, nuns/sisters, etc.), unions and non-profit organizations.
3. Worked for government /government corporation – a person who worked for the government or a government corporation or any of its instrumentalities.
4. Self-employed without any employee – a person who worked for profit or fees in own business, farm, profession or trade without any paid employee.
5. Employer in own family-operated farm or business – a person who worked in his own business, farm, profession or trade and had one or more regular paid employees, including paid family members.
6. Worked with pay in own family-operated farm or business – a person who worked in own family-operated farm or business and receives cash or a fixed share of the produce as payment for his service.

Background

7. Worked without pay on own family-operated farm or business – a member of the family who worked without pay in a farm or business operated by another family member. The room and board and any cash allowance given as incentives are not counted as compensation for these family workers.

Family expenditures - The expenses or disbursements made by the family purely for personal consumption. Therefore, it excludes all expenses in relation to farm or business operations, investment ventures, purchase of real property and other disbursements, which do not involve personal consumption.

Proportion of families with access to safe water supply – The ratio of the number of families who access water from community water system (piped into their dwelling, yard/plot or public tap) and protected wells to the total number of families.

Proportion of families with sanitary toilet – The ratio of the number of families with flush toilet (either owned or shared) and close pit to the total number of families.

Proportion of families with owned or owner-like possession of housing units – The ratio of the number of families with owned or amortized housing units to the total number of families.

Proportion of families with houses made of strong materials – The ratio to the total number of families of those families with houses having roofs and outer walls made of strong materials such as galvanized iron/aluminum, tile, concrete, brick stone and asbestos.

Proportion of families with gainfully employed family head – The ratio of the number of families with a family head who is gainfully employed to the total number of families.

Proportion of families with gainfully employed members 18 years old and over – The ratio of the number of families with gainfully employed members 18 years old and over to the total number of families with members 18 years old and over.

Proportion of families with children 6-12 years old in elementary – The ratio of the number of families with children 6-12 years old attending elementary school to the total number of families with children 6-12 years old.

Proportion of families with children 13-16 years old in high school – The ratio of the number of families with children 13-16 years old attending high school to the total number of families with children 13-16 years old.

Proportion of families with members 5-17 years old who are working – The ratio of the number of families with children 5-17 years old who are working to the total number of families with children 5-17 years old.

Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

APIS 2007 followed the regional grouping prescribed by Executive Order No. 36 signed on September 19, 2001 and Executive Order No. 103 signed on May 17, 2002. EO 36 provides for the reorganization of the administrative regions in Mindanao while EO 103 divides Region IV into Region IV-A and Region IV-B and transfers the province of Aurora to Region III. The findings from this survey are presented using the Lowest 30% and Highest 70% income strata.


A. Family Size and Characteristics of Family Heads

Average Family Size

- ❖ As of July 2007, there was an estimated 17.5 million families in the country (Table 1).
- ❖ On the average, a family was composed of five persons. The average family size of the families in the bottom 30% income stratum was 5.7 persons compared to 4.3 persons for families in the upper 70% income stratum. The bottom 30% of families in this report represents the poor families.
- ❖ Across the regions, Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) and Caraga registered the largest average family size at 5.4 and 5.0, respectively, while Cagayan Valley registered the smallest at 4.5.
- ❖ In all regions, the average family size was bigger for families in the bottom 30% income stratum than those in the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ The National Capital Region (NCR) had the largest average family size when the comparison is confined only to families in the bottom 30% income stratum, at 6.9 persons. Davao Region registered the smallest average family size at 5.3 persons.
- ❖ When the regional comparison is limited to the families in the upper 70% income stratum, ARMM and Central Luzon registered the biggest average family size at 4.6 persons and MIMAROPA had the lowest average family size at 3.9 persons.


FIGURE 1 Average Family Size by Income Stratum, Philippines 2007



Age and Sex of Family Heads

- ❖ Female family heads were generally older than male family heads. About 53 percent of female heads were aged 55 and over compared to 28 percent among male heads (Table 2).
- ❖ Female heads for families in the bottom 30% income stratum seemed to be older than for families in the upper 70% income stratum. Almost three in five female heads in the bottom 30% income stratum were aged 55 years or older while one in two female heads in the upper 70% income stratum was of the same age group.


FIGURE 2 Family Heads by Age and Sex, Philippines 2007



Educational Attainment of Family Heads

- ❖ A large percentage of family heads did not reach college. Three-fourths of family heads were either elementary undergraduates (21%), elementary graduates (20%), high school undergraduates (12%) or high school graduates (22%). Only 3 percent had no grade completed (Table 2).
- ❖ Those who had some college education comprised 10 percent and those who graduated from college, 11 percent.
- ❖ Heads of the families belonging to the bottom 30% income stratum tend to be less educated compared to heads of families in the upper 70% income stratum. Two out of three (67%) family heads belonging to the bottom 30% income stratum had at most an elementary education. In comparison, only one out of three (34%) family heads belonging to the upper 70% income stratum were of similar levels of education (no grade completed/pre-school, 2%; elementary undergraduates, 14%; and elementary graduates, 17%).
- ❖ About three out of ten (28 percent) family heads in the upper 70% income stratum had attended college or higher level of education, while only 5 percent of family heads in the bottom 30% income stratum had attained that level of education.

FIGURE 3 Family Heads by Highest Grade Completed, Philippines 2007




Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

Gainful Employment of Family Heads

- ❖ In 2007, four out of five (82%) family heads were gainfully employed (Table 2). A person was gainfully employed if he/she had a job/business at anytime from January 1 to June 30, 2007.
- ❖ Male heads had a higher employment rate at 88 percent compared to female heads with only 57 percent.
- ❖ Family heads in the bottom 30% income stratum had a higher rate of employment (90%) compared to their counterpart in the upper 70% income stratum (78%). This pattern was observed both among male heads (93% for bottom 30% and 85% for upper 70%) and among female heads (65% for bottom 30% and 55% for upper 70%).

FIGURE 4 Gainfully Employed Heads by Sex and Income Stratum, Philippines 2007




B. Housing Characteristics

Tenure Status of Housing Unit and Lot

- ❖ Sixty-nine percent of families in the country owned the house and lot they occupied (Table 3). The remaining 31 percent occupied houses and lots under the following tenure: own house, rent-free lot with consent of owner (13%), rent house/room including lot (8%), rent-free house and lot with consent of owner (5%), own house, rent-free lot without consent of owner (3%), own house, rent lot (3%), or rent-free house and lot without consent of owner (less than one percent).
- ❖ Among the families in the upper 70% income stratum, 70 percent owned their house and lot while among the bottom 30% income stratum, 64 percent.


FIGURE 5 Families by Tenure Status of Housing Unit, Philippines 2007



- ❖ Among the regions, NCR (55%), Caraga (52%) and Western Visayas (52%) had the lowest percentage of families owning their house and lot.
- ❖ In NCR, only 39 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum owned the house and lot they were occupying. Three out of 10 families in this income stratum rented the house and lot they occupied.


FIGURE 6 Percentage of Families with Own or Owner-like Possession of Housing Unit and Lot by Income Stratum, Philippines 2007



Floor Area of Housing Unit

- ❖ The majority of families were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 49 square meters (sq. m.) (Table 4).
- ❖ Three out of ten (32%) families were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. while 29 percent were in housing units with a floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m.

- ❖ Among the families in the bottom 30% income stratum, the largest proportion (47%) occupied housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. Three out of ten (30%) families in this income stratum were living in housing units with a floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m.


Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

- ❖ Families belonging to the upper 70% income stratum were living in housing units with a larger floor area. Forty-four percent of the families in the upper 70% income stratum lived in housing units with a floor area of at least 50 sq. m. compared to 17 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ At least 60 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum in Davao (67%) and Zamboanga Peninsula (60%) had housing units with floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. Two out of five (41%) families in the upper 70% income stratum in Zamboanga Peninsula were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m.

Type of Building/House

- ❖ The majority (93%) of Filipino families were residing in single houses (Table 5). The other families dwelt in either apartment/accessoria/condominium/townhouse (4%), duplex houses (3%), or commercial/industrial/agricultural buildings (less than one percent).
- ❖ In NCR, 15 percent were living in apartments, accessoria, condominiums or townhouses. Hence, much lower percentage (78%) of families in the NCR were living in single houses.

FIGURE 8 Families by Type of Building/House they Reside, Philippines 2007




Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

Construction Materials of the Roof and Outer Walls

- ❖ The majority of Filipino houses had roofs and outer walls made of strong materials. About 72 percent of families had strong roofs and 64 percent had strong outer walls (Tables 6 & 7). Strong materials for roof and outer walls refer to galvanized iron or aluminum, tile, concrete, brick stone or asbestos while light materials refer to cogon, nipa or anahaw.
- ❖ As expected, a larger proportion of families in the upper 70% income stratum had housing units made of strong roofs (80%) and outer walls (74%) compared to families in the bottom 30% income stratum (53% and 41%, respectively).
- ❖ Among the regions, CAR recorded the highest percentage of families living in houses with strong roofs and outer walls (92% and 89%, respectively). On the other hand, Zamboanga Peninsula had the lowest percentage (51%) of families living in houses that used strong materials for their roofs and Western Visayas had the least percentage (37%) of families living in houses with strong outer walls.
- ❖ More than 30 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum were living in houses with roofs and walls made of light materials (33% and 34%, respectively).


FIGURE 9 Families by Type of Construction Materials of the Roof and Outer Walls of the Building they Occupy, Philippines 2007



Electricity

- ❖ Of the 17.5 million families, 84 percent families had electricity in their homes (Table 8). All regions registered higher proportions of families with electricity in their dwellings in 2007 APIS compared to 2004 APIS.
- ❖ About 94 percent of families in the upper 70% income stratum had electricity in their homes compared to 62 percent in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ In NCR, 99 percent of families had electricity in their homes. Central Luzon was next to NCR in terms of families having electricity in their houses at 96 percent. The most disadvantaged region was ARMM where 37 percent of families had no electricity in their homes.
- ❖ Except for NCR and ARMM, proportions of families with electricity in their homes remarkably differ between the two income strata.

FIGURE 10 Percentage of Families with Electricity in their House, by Region, Philippines 2007




Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

Main Source of Water Supply

- ❖ Almost 83 percent of the total families had access to a safe source of water supply (Table 8). Considered as clean and safe sources of water supply are community water system piped into dwelling, yard/plot or public tap and protected well.
- ❖ The remaining 17 percent of families obtained their water from sources considered unsafe, such as unprotected well (6%), developed spring (5%), undeveloped spring (2%), river, stream, pond, lake or dam (1%), rainwater (less than one percent), tanker truck or peddler (2%) and other sources (1%).
- ❖ Nine in 10 families that belong to the upper 70% income stratum had access to safe water compared to seven in 10 families in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ Four regions had over 90 percent of their families with access to safe water. These are Central Luzon (94%), Cagayan Valley (93%), Ilocos (91%) and NCR (91%).
- ❖ In ARMM, less than half (48%) of the families had access to safe water.


FIGURE 11 Families by Main Source of Water Supply, Philippines 2007



Toilet Facility

- ❖ The proportion of Filipino families with sanitary toilets was 88 percent (Table 9). For this survey, sanitary toilet refers to flush toilet (either owned or shared) and close pit type of toilet facility.
- ❖ Other families used open pit (4%), drop or overhang (1%), pail system (1%) and other types of toilets (less than one percent), which are considered unsanitary toilets. There were 6 percent families with no toilet facilities in their homes at all.
- ❖ Families in the bottom 30% income stratum were more likely to use an unsanitary toilet than families in the upper 70% income stratum. The percentage of families in the bottom 30% income stratum without sanitary toilet at home is 26 percent compared to 5 percent among families in the upper 70%.
- ❖ Regions with over 20 percent of families without sanitary toilets are Central Visayas (20%), Zamboanga Peninsula (21%), Eastern Visayas (22%) and ARMM (50%).

FIGURE 12 Families by Type of Toilet Facility Used, Philippines 2007



Household Conveniences

- ❖ Television was the most visible household appliance in Filipino homes. Seven out of ten (69%) families owned this (Table 10). Television was also the leading appliance for the upper 70% income stratum with 82 percent of families in this income group owning this. For the bottom 30% income stratum, radio/radio cassette was the most common household convenience with 41 percent of families in this income group owning this.
- ❖ Aircon (8%), personal computer (9%) and landline telephone (11%) were the least common household conveniences. This is true for both income strata. Only less than one percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum owned these conveniences. The percentages of ownership of aircon, personal computer and landline telephone for the upper 70% income stratum were 11, 12, and 15 percent, respectively.
- ❖ Television was the leading household convenience in the regions. Over 50 percent of families in the regions own a television, except Mimaropa (46%), Zamboanga Peninsula (45%) and ARMM (36%).
- ❖ Cellular phone was the second most popular household convenience with 58 percent of families in the country having at least one member owning this. Even among families in the bottom 30% income stratum, a significant proportion (28%) owned a cellular phone. Among families in the upper 70% income stratum, the proportion is 71 percent.

FIGURE 13 Percentage of Families Owning Household Conveniences, Philippines 2007




C. Education

Highest Grade Completed of Population 5 years and Over

- ❖ Almost one-fourth (24%) of persons 5 years old and over were elementary undergraduates (Table 11).
- ❖ Persons 5 years old and over in the upper 70% income stratum are more highly educated than their counterpart in the bottom 30% income stratum. In 2007, of the population 5 years old and over in the upper 70% income stratum, 26 percent had reached college compared to only 5 percent for the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, the elementary undergraduates comprised the largest percentage (35%) followed by elementary graduates (17%) and high school undergraduates (16%).
- ❖ In NCR, Ilocos, Central Luzon and CALABARZON, the biggest percentage of persons 5 years old and over were high school graduates, with the percentage ranging from 22 to 25 percent. In other regions, the largest percentage of persons 5 years old and over were elementary undergraduates, ranging from 24 percent in CAR to 33 percent in Eastern Visayas and Zamboanga Peninsula.
- ❖ In NCR, more than 30 percent of persons 5 years old and over had gone to college, that is, 15 percent were college undergraduates and 16 percent were college graduates or higher.
- ❖ In ARMM, one in 5 persons five years old and over has never been to school.

FIGURE 14 Population 5 Years Old and Over by Highest Grade Completed, Philippines 2007



Schooling Status

- ❖ For this round of APIS, the cut-off age for school attendance was reduced to 3 years to measure attendance in early childhood learning schools like nursery, kindergarten and preparatory schools. School refers to formal schools including vocational/technical schools offering post-secondary courses. A person who was in school during the time of interview is considered as attending school.
- ❖ The population 3 to 24 years of age, which numbered approximately 43 million in July 2007, constituted almost half (48%) of the total population in the country (Table 12).
- ❖ The total enrolled as of July 2007 numbered to some 27 million or 64 percent of total persons of schooling ages, that is, ages 3 to 24 years.
- ❖ Three out of five persons aged 3 to 24 years in both income strata were attending school, that is, 61 percent in the bottom 30% income stratum and 66 percent in the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ Those attending school comprised mainly of the age group 6 to 9 years (29%) and the age group 10 to 12 years (23%).


FIGURE 15 Population 3 to 24 Years Old Who Were Attending School during School Year 2007-2008 by Schooling Age and Income Stratum, Philippines 2007

- ❖ Among the regions, CAR registered the highest percentage of school attendees at 70 percent while ARMM had the lowest percentage at 55 percent.
- ❖ A larger proportion of females 3 to 24 years old (66%) were attending school compared to their male counterparts (62%). This was true in all regions, except NCR, and for the two income strata in the regions.
- ❖ Persons of school age in the upper 70% income stratum were more likely to pursue higher education compared to those in the bottom 30% income stratum. While 17 percent of the school age population in the upper 70% income stratum were attending college or post graduate schools, the corresponding proportion in the bottom 30% income stratum is 4 percent (Table 13).
- ❖ In nine out of 17 regions, the proportion of persons of school age who were attending college was below the national average of 12 percent. These were Central Visayas (12%), Davao (11%), Western Visayas (11%), Zamboanga Peninsula (10%), Eastern Visayas (9%), SOCCSKSARGEN (9%), Caraga (8%), Bicol (8%) and MIMAROPA (8%).



Reasons for not Attending School

- ❖ There were approximately 11.8 million persons 6 to 24 years old who were out of school in school year 2007-2008 (June 2007 to March/April 2008) or in the first semester June 2007 to October 2007 (Table 14).
- ❖ The most frequently cited reasons for not attending school were employment/looking for work (25%), high cost of education (21%) and lack of personal interest (20%). These are also the most common reasons reported for those not attending school in both income strata.
- ❖ For 7 percent of the out-of-school children and youth, completed schooling was the reason cited for not attending school.
- ❖ Lack of personal interest (28%), employment/looking for work (27%), and high cost of education (22%) were the top reasons why males were not attending school.
- ❖ A slightly different pattern was observed among females where marriage, rather than lack of personal interest, in addition to employment and high cost of education kept most of the females out of schools.
- ❖ Though ARMM had higher percentage of persons attending college compared to most of the regions, it has the lowest percentage (2%) of persons in schooling ages who were reported to have finished schooling hence were not attending schools. The corresponding proportion in other regions ranges from 4 percent to 11 percent.



Children in Elementary Grade

- ❖ A total of 8.5 million families had children aged 6 to 12 years (Table 15). Of this number, 8.3 million or 97 percent had children in this age group who were in elementary grades.
- ❖ Similarly, among families in the upper 70% income stratum with children 6 to 12 years old, 98 percent were with children in that age group who were in elementary grades, while for the bottom 30% income stratum, the proportion was 95 percent.
- ❖ ARMM posted the lowest percentage (86%) of families with children 6 to 12 years old who were enrolled in elementary. It is the only region with a proportion of less than 90 percent. NCR registered the highest percentage at 99 percent. The same trend was observed in both income strata.


FIGURE 18 Percentage of Families with Children 6 to 12 Years Old Who Were in Elementary Grades, by Income Stratum, Philippines 2007



Children in High School

- ❖ Of the 6.0 million families with children aged 13 to 16 years, 86 percent or 5.1 million families were reported having children in this age bracket who were in high school (Table 16).
- ❖ Four Luzon regions namely NCR, CAR, Ilocos and CALABARZON, registered the highest proportion of families with children 13 to 16 years old attending high school with corresponding percentages of 92 percent, 92 percent, 88 percent and 87 percent.
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, NCR registered the highest percentage of families with children 13 to 16 years old in high school with 88 percent. Davao posted the lowest percentage with 72 percent.
- ❖ For the upper 70% income stratum, CAR (95%) had the largest percentage while ARMM (86%) had the lowest percentage.

FIGURE 19 Percentage of Families with Children 13 to 16 Years Old Who Were in High School by Income Stratum, Philippines 2007




D. Economic Characteristics

Families with Working Members 18 Years Old and Over


- ❖ There were 17.5 million families with members aged 18 years and over (Table 17). Of this number, 93 percent or 16.3 million families were reported having members in this age bracket who were gainfully employed.
- ❖ In all regions, except NCR, the proportion of families with members aged 18 years and over who were gainfully employed was higher for the bottom 30% income stratum than for the upper 70% income stratum (Figures 20 & 21). This is because families in the bottom 30% income stratum are more likely to have members 25 years and over who engage in an economic activity compared to families in the upper 70% income stratum. Also, families in the bottom 30% income stratum are more likely to have members aged 18 to 24 who are employed rather than in schools.

Families with Working Children 5-17 Years Old

- ❖ The Labor Code of the Philippines specifies that no child below 18 years old shall be employed except when he/she works directly under the sole responsibility of his parents/guardian and his/her employment does not in any way interfere with his/her schooling. Although the survey results would not show whether the conditions stated above are met, it would show the extent or magnitude of families whose children below 18 years old are working.
- ❖ Of the 11.6 million families with members aged 5 to 17 years, 12 percent or 1.4 million families were reported to have working children (Table 18).
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, one out of five (21%) families with members 5 to 17 years old had working children while for the upper 70% income stratum, only one in ten (7%) of such families was reported to have working children.
- ❖ One out of five families with members 5 to 17 years old in Eastern Visayas (23%), CAR (22%) and MIMAROPA (19%) had working children. In NCR, only 4 percent of such families had working children.
- ❖ In all regions, except in NCR, there was a high percentage of families in the bottom 30% income stratum with working children, ranging from 12 percent to 36 percent.



Families Engaged in Any Economic Activity

❖ There are three major economic activities that contribute to a family's income. These are wages and salary, family sustenance activities and entrepreneurial activities. Other sources of income include net share of crops, cash receipts both from abroad and domestic source, rentals, interest, pension, dividends, etc.

❖ In 2007, the number of families with at least one member reported to have engaged in any type of economic activity in the 6 months preceding the survey was 16.7 million (Table 19). Families with members who were wage and salary workers accounted for 66 percent; those engaged in entrepreneurial activity, 62 percent; and those engaged in family sustenance activity, 47 percent. For this report, more than one economic activity can be reported for one family.

❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, among families engaged in an economic activity in the 6 months prior to the survey, 74 percent were involved in family sustenance and 73 percent in entrepreneurial activities. Families with wage and salary earning members comprised 55 percent. In the upper 70% income stratum, the largest proportion (71%) of families with members engaged in an economic activity had members who were salary and wage earners.


❖ Among the families engaged in an economic activity in Cagayan Valley, 84 percent were involved in family sustenance activities while in Western Visayas, 76 percent. On the other hand, the percentage of families engaged in family sustenance activities in NCR accounted for less than one percent.

❖ A large proportion of the families in all regions had members who were salary and wage workers, except for ARMM with 20 percent only.

Employed Persons 5 Years Old and Over by Class of Worker

- ❖ Workers are classified into 3 major classes namely, wage and salary workers, own account workers and unpaid family workers. Wage and salary workers include those who worked for private households, private establishments and government offices and those who worked with pay in own family-operated farm or business. Own account workers include the self-employed and employer in own family-operated farm or business.
- ❖ Among employed persons in 2007 which numbered around 36 million, the largest proportion (54%) were wage and salary workers, followed by own account workers at 33 percent (Table 20). Unpaid family workers had the least percentage at 12 percent. Similar pattern was observed in all regions except in ARMM.
- ❖ In ARMM, three out of five (61%) employed persons were own account workers and almost one-fourth were unpaid family workers. Only 15 percent were wage and salary workers.
- ❖ The largest proportion of employed persons in the bottom 30% income stratum and upper 70% income stratum were wage and salary workers with corresponding percentages of 42 percent and 61 percent.

E. Family's Health and Welfare


Illness/Injury Work-Related

- ❖ There were 15.3 million persons 5 years old and over or 19 percent of the population 5 years and older who got ill or injured one month prior to the conduct of the survey in 2007 (Table 21). Of this number, 22 percent had work-related illness/injury.
- ❖ Of population 5 years and older who got ill or injured one month before the survey, the proportion of those whose ailments or injuries were work related was higher in 11 regions compared to the national average. These regions were SOCCSKSARGEN (37%), Caraga (33%), ARMM (31%), Cagayan Valley (28%), CAR (28%), Bicol (26%), Northern Mindanao (26%), Central Visayas (25%), Eastern Visayas (25%), MIMAROPA (25%) and Zamboanga Peninsula (23%).

Health Facilities Visited in the Past Six Months

- ❖ One out of three (32%) families had at least one member who visited any health facility during the six months prior to the survey (Table 22). The percentage recorded for the bottom 30% income stratum was 30 percent, and 33 percent for the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ The most commonly visited health facility was the government hospital at 38 percent. Similar percentages were observed for both income strata (40% for the bottom 30% income stratum and 37% for the upper 70% income stratum).
- ❖ Rural health units/health centers were more popular to families in ARMM (37%) and MIMAROPA (35%) than in other regions.

FIGURE 24 Families with Member Who Visited Health Facility in the Past 6 Months, Philippines 2007




Membership in Any Health, Life and/or Pre-Need Insurance System

- ❖ Among the health, life and/or pre-need insurance systems, Philhealth had the largest membership with 42 percent of families in the country having at least one Philhealth member (Table 23). It is because membership in Philhealth is mandatory to government and private workers, including own account workers. Membership in the Social Security System (SSS) was also reported by a significant percentage of families (35%). The same trend was observed in both income strata and in all regions except in NCR and ARMM.
- ❖ A higher proportion of families in the upper 70% income stratum than in the bottom 30% income stratum had at least one member who is a Philhealth member or an SSS member. This finding is true for all regions.
- ❖ There were more SSS members than Philhealth members in the NCR. In this region, three out of five (62%) families had at least one member of SSS, while half of families had at least one member of Philhealth.
- ❖ In ARMM, only 20 percent of families had at least one member of Philhealth. Few families had a member enrolled in other health, life or pre-need insurance systems.

Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

- ❖ At the national level, 8 percent of families reported membership in GSIS. Less than 5 percent of families had members in each of the other health, life and/or pre-need insurance systems: life insurance company, 4 percent; private health insurance company, 3 percent; pre-need insurance plan company, 2 percent; health maintenance organization, 1 percent; and other insurance system, 3 percent.


FIGURE 25 Families with At Least One Member in a Health, Life and/or Pre-Need Insurance System, Philippines 2007



Awareness of Government's Program on Affordable Drugs/Medicines

- ❖ Almost half (49%) of all families in the country or 8.5 million families had at least one member who is aware of the government's program on affordable drugs/medicines (Table 24). Of this number, 43 percent or 3.6 million families purchased medicines/drugs under this government program.
- ❖ A larger proportion of families (51%) in the bottom 30% income stratum compared to those in the upper 70% income stratum (39%) who were aware of the government's program on affordable drugs/medicines had purchased medicines/drugs under this program.
- ❖ More than half of the families who were aware of any government's program on affordable drugs/medicines in MIMAROPA (65%), Central Luzon (52%) and CAR (51%) had actually purchased medicines/drugs under this program.
- ❖ Among those families who did not purchase medicines/drugs under the government's program on affordable drugs/medicines, more than half (53%) stated that the program was not implemented in their place of residence (Table 25). One out of five families did not need to buy medicines/drugs while 14 percent cited that prescribed medicines were not available. The same pattern was observed in both income strata.
- ❖ The most cited reason in the regions for not buying medicines/drugs under the program was that the program was not implemented in their place of residence. The highest percentage was registered in ARMM at 80 percent.



Awareness of Lending Institution

- ❖ About 62 percent of total families in the country or 10.8 million families had members who were aware of any lending institution or private individuals whose business is lending money with interests (Table 26). Of this number, more than one-fourth (26%) had availed of loan in the 6 months preceding the survey.
- ❖ In all regions except Zamboanga Peninsula and NCR, more than 20 percent of families who were aware of any lending institution/individual had actually availed of loan in the 6 months prior the survey.
- ❖ The most common source of loan was a relative or friend (36%). This is followed by microfinance institutions and informal lenders with 17 percent of families availing loan from each source (Table 27). Similar pattern was observed for both income strata.
- ❖ For a majority of the regions, the highest percentage of families availed loan from a relative or friend. For Central Visayas and Eastern Visayas, the most common source of loan was microfinance institutions while it was informal lenders for NCR, Northern Mindanao and Davao. The largest percentage of families in Caraga availed loan from banks while other source of loan for Western Visayas.


FIGURE 27 Families Who Availed of Loan in the Six Months Preceding the Survey, by Source of Loan, Philippines 2007

- ❖ The data on the purpose for availing loan shows that 44 percent of families have availed loan for their family's daily needs (Table 28). This purpose was cited by more than half (55%) of families in the bottom 30% income stratum and by 38 percent of families in the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ A significant percentage (32%) of total families have availed loan for business purpose. For the same purpose, 28 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum and 35 percent of those in the upper 70% income stratum availed of loan in the 6 months prior to the survey.
- ❖ For all regions in Visayas and Mindanao, except SOCCSKARGEN and ARMM, the highest percentage of families have availed loan for business purposes.

Acquisition of House and/or Lot thru the Assistance of Government Housing or Financing Program

- ❖ Only 3 percent of total families or 535 thousand families had members who acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program (Table 29).

Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

- ❖ Among the regions, Central Luzon had the highest percentage of families who acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program at 5 percent.
- ❖ Three in ten families have acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program in 1991 or earlier (Table 30). In 1992-1998, 30 percent of total families have acquired a house and/or lot thru government housing or financing program, 7 percent in 1999-2000 and 11 percent in 2001-2003.


Acquisition of Agricultural Land Under the CARP Land-Distribution Program

- ❖ About 22 percent or 3.9 million families owned a land used for agricultural purposes (Table 31). Of this number, 12 percent had acquired their agricultural lands under the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) land-distribution program.
- ❖ Three in ten (31%) families in the bottom 30% income stratum owned a land used for agricultural purposes compared to one in five (18%) families among the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ Ten percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum who owned lands used for agricultural purposes had acquired their lands under the CARP. The corresponding percentage among families in the upper 70% income stratum is 13 percent.
- ❖ Among the regions, Central Luzon registered the highest percentage of families who acquired their agricultural lands under the land-distribution program at 30 percent. A significant percentage (27%) of families in NCR had agricultural lands acquired thru CARP.
- ❖ For ten regions, the proportion of families with lands acquired thru the CARP was lower than the national estimate. These were MIMAROPA (11%), Zamboanga Peninsula (11%), Eastern Visayas (10%), CALABARZON (9%), Central Visayas (8%), SOCCSKSARGEN (7%), Cagayan Valley (6%), CAR (3%), Ilocos (3%), and ARMM (2%).
- ❖ The lowest percentage of families with agricultural lands acquired under the CARP land-distribution program was in ARMM at 2 percent.

Scholarship

- ❖ About 5 percent or 804 thousand families had at least one member who is a recipient of any scholarship assistance from any government program or from any private individual/organization (Table 32).
- ❖ Thirty percent of total families had at least one member with scholarship assistance from private organizations, 26 percent from government schools and 13 percent from public officials. Sixteen percent of families were awarded scholarship by other sponsors.
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, 31 percent of families had at least one member with scholarship assistance from private organizations while 20 percent from government schools.
- ❖ Three out of five families in the upper 70% income stratum had at least one member with scholarship assistance either from private organizations or government schools.

Hunger

- ❖ One in ten (9%) families had experienced hunger 3 months prior to the conduct of the survey (Table 33).
- ❖ In the upper 70% income stratum, 7 percent of the families experienced hunger during the cited period while in the bottom 30% income stratum, 15 percent.
- ❖ In NCR, two out of five (39%) families in the bottom 30% income stratum had experienced hunger.
- ❖ CAR and ARMM had reported the lowest incidence of hunger, with 2 percent and 3 percent, respectively, of their families said to have experienced hunger 3 months preceding the survey.

F. Family Income and Expenditure

Total Family Income

- ❖ The total family income for the period January to June 2007 reached ₱1.42 trillion (Table 34). Almost 90 percent of this income or ₱1.27 trillion was earned by the families belonging to the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ The largest percentage (44%) of total family income was from salaries and wages. Income from entrepreneurial activities accounted for 23 percent of the total family income. A considerable percentage (32%) of the total family income was derived from other sources.
- ❖ Almost three-fourths of the ₱149 billion earned by families in the bottom 30% income stratum was contributed by wage and salary workers (36%) and those with entrepreneurial activities (39%).
- ❖ Almost half (45%) of the total income of the upper 70% income stratum came from salaries and wages while 21 percent was from entrepreneurial activities and 33 percent from other sources.
- ❖ In all regions except CAR, Ilocos, Western Visayas and ARMM, the biggest share of total family income came from salaries and wages. In CAR, Ilocos and Western Visayas, the largest percentage of total family income came from other sources, while it was from entrepreneurial activities in ARMM.

Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

- ❖ The average family income, computed by dividing the total income for the period by the total number of families, amounted to ₱81,321 (Table 36). The average family income for the bottom 30% income stratum was ₱28,446 while ₱103,982 for the upper 70% income stratum.

Family Expenditure and Savings

- ❖ Total family expenditure from January 1 to June 30, 2007 amounted to ₱1.2 trillion (Table 35). The total family savings for the same period was estimated at ₱178.6 billion.
- ❖ Families in the upper 70% income stratum had a saving of ₱192.2 billion.
- ❖ Meanwhile, families in the bottom 30% income stratum disbursed ₱13.6 billion. This income group spent more than what they have earned. This is true for bottom 30% income stratum in all regions.
- ❖ NCR, Central Luzon and CALABARZON, which had the biggest income, recorded the largest savings.
- ❖ Bicol reported the highest deficit of ₱2.1 billion in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ The average family expenditure at the national level was ₱71,117, ₱31,033 for the bottom 30% income stratum and ₱88,296 for the upper 70% income stratum.

Average Per Capita Income and Average Per Capita Expenditure

- ❖ Average per capita income is computed by dividing the total income for the period by the total population. Likewise, average per capita expenditure equals total expenditure divided by total population.
- ❖ The average per capita income for the period January 1 to June 30, 2007 was about ₱17,200 (Table 37). The average per capita income for the bottom 30% income stratum was ₱5,000 while ₱24,000 for the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ On the other hand, the average per capita expenditure at the national level was ₱15,000, ₱5,500 for the bottom 30% income stratum and ₱20,400 for the upper 70% income stratum.

Highlights of the 2007 APIS Results

- ❖ NCR reported the highest per capita income (₱31,600) and per capita expenditure (₱27,400).
- ❖ ARMM had a per capita income of ₱7,600; it is the only region with a value of less than ₱10,000. ARMM also recorded the lowest average per capita expenditure at ₱7,300.
