

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# **FOREWORD**

The National Statistics Office (NSO) is pleased to present this final report on the 2010 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS). The survey, designed to provide non-income indicators of poverty, is the seventh in a series of poverty indicators surveys conducted nationwide since 1998. The 2010 APIS provides information on the demographic characteristics, health status, education, economic characteristics, housing, water and sanitation, and other information that can be used for the assessment of Filipino family's living conditions.

This publication presents the results of the 2010 APIS. It provides national and regional estimates on selected non-income poverty indicators and describes the profiles of families who belong to the bottom 30 percent and upper 70 percent per capita income stratum.

The results from the 2010 APIS can be used by policy makers and program implementers in their planning, assessment and evaluation of the various programs designed to reduce poverty incidence in the country. It can also be used by researchers interested in analyzing the poverty situation in the Philippines using non-income indicators.

The NSO wishes to extend its sincerest gratitude to everyone who contributed to the successful completion of the 2010 APIS especially the respondents who generously shared their time and information to enable us to gather data that can be used in analyzing the poverty situation in the country, and the various NSO employees who untiringly carried out the various activities of the survey, from the preparatory phase to the post-enumeration phase.

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
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# Background

The 2010 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS) was conducted by the National Statistics Office (NSO) in August 2010. The 2010 APIS is the seventh in the series of annual poverty indicators surveys conducted nationwide. Since 1998, APIS has been conducted during the years when the Family Income and Expenditures Survey (FIES) is not conducted, except in 2001 and 2005 due to budgetary constraints.

## **Objectives of the Survey**

The APIS is a nationwide survey designed to provide non-income indicators related to poverty at the national and regional levels. It is designed to gather data on the socio-economic profile of families and other information that are related to their living conditions. Specifically, it generates indicators which are correlated with poverty, such as indicators regarding the ownership or possession of house and lot, the types of the materials of the roofs and walls of their housing units, their access to safe water, the types of toilet facility they use, and presence of family members of specified characteristics such as children 6-12 years old enrolled in elementary, children 13-16 years old enrolled in high school, members 18 years old and over gainfully employed, and working children 5-17 years old.

### Sampling Design

The 2010 APIS is a sample survey designed to provide data representative of the country and its 17 administrative regions. The survey's sample design helps ensure this representativeness. The 2010 APIS used the 2003 master sample created for household surveys on the basis of the 2000 Census of Population and Housing (CPH) results. The survey used four replicates of the master sample. For each region (domain) and stratum, a three-stage sampling scheme was used: the selection of primary sampling units (PSUs) for the first stage, of sample enumeration areas (EAs) for the second stage, and of sample housing units for the third stage. PSUs within a region were stratified based on the proportion of households living in housing units made of strong materials, proportion of households in the barangay engaged in agricultural activities and per capita income of the city/municipality.

As earlier mentioned, a three-stage sampling design was used in each stratum within a region. In the first stage, primary sampling units (PSUs) were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 Census. PSUs consisted of a barangay or a group of contiguous barangays. In the second stage, in each sampled PSU, EAs were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 Census. An EA is defined as an area with discernable boundaries consisting of approximately 350 contiguous households. In the third stage, from each sampled EA, housing units were selected using systematic sampling.

For operational considerations, at most 30 housing units were selected per sample EA. All households in sample housing units were interviewed except for sample housing units with more than three households. In such a housing unit, three households were randomly selected with equal probability.

Only household members related to the household head by blood, marriage or adoption were considered as members of the sample household in APIS. Family members of the household head who are working abroad were excluded.

The results presented in this report are weighted to ensure that the data are representative of the population of the Philippines and its regions. Sampling weights, or expansion factors, were applied to the data obtained from sample households in order to derive estimates for the larger population from which the sample households were selected for the purpose of survey interviewing. The weights or expansion factors applied to each sample household reflected the probability of the households being selected for the survey sample. More specifically, the basic sampling weights assigned were equal to the inverse of the joint probability of selection in the three stages of sample selection. Since the sample was self-weighting within regions (domains) or strata, each household in a particular stratum received the same weight or raising factor.

The weights adjustment factor takes into account the sample EAs which were not enumerated and households which were not interviewed. The product of the basic weights and weights adjustment factor was used to obtain the preliminary weighted estimates of the total number of families.

In order to make the weighted estimate of the total number of persons by age group and sex consistent with the estimated number of persons by age group and sex as of August 2010, a final weight adjustment factor was used. The estimated number of persons by age group and sex, by region as of August 2010 was derived using 2000 Census-based population projection for the region. In each region, the final weight adjustment is equal to the ratio of the estimated number of persons by age group and sex as of August 2010 to the preliminary weighted estimate of the total number of persons by age group and sex from the 2010 APIS data.

#### **Response Rate**

Of the 21,023 eligible sample households for the 2010 APIS, 20,103 were successfully interviewed. This translated to a response rate of 95.6 percent at the national level. Households which were not interviewed were either refused to be interviewed or not available or away during the enumeration period.

#### Limitations of the Data

Data gathered from APIS are results of a sample survey and are therefore subject to sampling variations, that is, sampling errors are expected since the data are not obtained through complete enumeration or census.

The survey covered a national sample of households deemed sufficient to provide estimates about the population at the national and regional levels only. Hence, tabulations and cross-tabulations of variables at lower geographic levels such as provincial and municipal levels are not generated since these may not be statistically reliable.

Survey estimates may also be affected by non-sampling errors such as deliberate under or over reporting of income and expenditures or reluctance on the part of the respondents to reveal their true levels of income/expenditures.

Moreover, considering that both cash and non-cash expenditures and income are gathered in APIS, valuation of non-cash income and expenditures may pose some problems. The instructions are to use market prices prevailing in the locality for goods and services received as gifts, and farm gate prices for goods consumed from own production. However, market prices may not be available for all items in the locality or market prices/farm gate prices may be highly variable for different localities.

Further, data users attempting to match 2010 APIS and the 2009 FIES should take note of the differences in the reference period. The 2009 FIES was conducted in two visits covering the periods January to June 2009 and July to December 2009 while 2010 APIS covered January to June 2010 only.

The description or intention of each section of the 2010 APIS questionnaire is presented below.

**Identification and Other Information** – contains information about the geographic identification (region, province, city/municipality and barangay, EA code, sample housing serial number and household control number), design codes (replicate, stratum, PSU No., rotation group and number of households in the housing unit) and result of visit to the sample housing unit/household.

**Demographic Characteristics** – obtains the demographic characteristics of each family member such as relationship to the family head, sex, age and marital status.

**Health Status** – obtains information on whether each family member got ill or injured a month prior to the survey and whether the illness and/or injury experienced by each member age 5 years or older is work-related or not.

**Schooling Status and Highest Grade Completed** – determines whether a family member aged 3 to 24 years is currently attending formal school, and if so, the grade or year level the member is currently attending. If the member is not currently attending school, then the reason for not doing so is also asked. It also determines the educational attainment of the family members 5 years old and over. This item also will give an idea on 'school readiness' among children in Grade 1 if they had attended preschool.

**Economic Characteristics** – obtains information on the employment status of each family member 5 years old and over. It also includes questions on occupation and business engaged in by the member during the past six months, and the salaries and wages from employment of each working family member.

**Housing, Water and Sanitation** – obtains information that relates to housing characteristics and household conveniences/amenities owned by the family. The main source of water supply and kind of toilet facility used were also asked.

Other Relevant Information – determines the extent or pervasiveness of corruption and to look at the public services that are prone to corruption. It will attempt to provide a description of the source/s of corruption, i.e. whether it is supply-driven (from the "bribe giver") or demand-driven (from the "bribe taker").

**Hunger** – determines if any member of the family experienced hunger in the past 3 months because he/she did not have anything to eat, and if so, the frequency of experiencing hunger.

**Family Sustenance and Entrepreneurial Activities** – determines if any member of the family is engaged in any of the following family sustenance and entrepreneurial activities: family sustenance activity, net share of crops, fruits and vegetables produced

or livestock or poultry raised by other households, crop farming and gardening, livestock and poultry raising, fishing, forestry and hunting, wholesale and retail, manufacturing, community, social, recreational and personal services, transportation, storage and communication services, mining and quarrying, construction or entrepreneurial activities not elsewhere classified. This section asks for the total net income, value consumed and value given away as gifts of the products derived/produced from such activity.

Other Sources of Income – obtains information on other sources of family income not derived from work.

**Other Receipts** – obtains information on the sources of non-income receipts of families, that is, those that do not come from earnings, property income and gifts received.

**Family Expenditures** – determines the expenses made by the family purely for family members' personal consumption.

## **Concepts and Definitions**

**Bottom 30%** – In descending order of the family per capita income, the bottom 30% refers to the bottom 30 percent of the total families in the income distribution. This grouping of families was used as a proxy for those falling below the poverty line.

**Upper 70%** – In descending order of the family per capita income, the upper 70% refers to the upper 70 percent of the total families in the income distribution. It is the complement of the bottom 30 percent.

**Respondent** – An adult knowledgeable member of the sample family who can provide accurate answers to all or most of the questions in the survey.

**Family** – Aggregate of persons bound by ties of kinship, who live together under the same roof and eat together or share in common the family food. For the purpose of this survey, a household can be classified as a nuclear family, extended family or a single person family. For a household comprising of members who are not related with each other by blood, marriage or adoption, only the head of the household is considered. This case is a single person family.

**Family head** - An adult member of the family who is responsible for the care and organization of the family or who is regarded as such by the members of the family.

**Highest educational attainment** - The highest grade or year completed in school, college or university.

#### Background

**Work** - Any activity of a person done for pay, profit or without pay on family farm or enterprise or an activity done by a farm operator or member of his family on another's farm on "exchange labor" arrangement. In addition, any activity that a person does during the reference period in relation to minor activities such as home gardening, raising of crops/fruits, raising hogs/poultry, fishing, etc. for home consumption and manufacturing for home use are also considered as work.

**Building** - Any structure built, designed or intended for the enclosure, shelter or protection of any person, animal or property. It consists of one or more rooms and/or other spaces, covered by a roof, and usually enclosed within external walls or with common dividing walls with adjacent buildings, which usually extend from the foundation to the roof.

Housing unit - A structurally separate and independent place of abode which, by the way it has been constructed, converted, or arranged, is intended for habitation by one or more households. Structures or parts of structures which are not intended for habitation, such as commercial, industrial, and agricultural buildings, or natural and manmade shelters such as caves, boats, abandoned trucks, culverts, etc., but are used as living quarters by households, are also considered as housing units.

**Floor area** - The area enclosed by the exterior walls of the housing unit. In case of several floors, the area of the housing unit is the sum of areas of all floors.

**Class of worker** - The relationship of the worker to the establishment in which he/she works.

The classes of workers are:

- **a. Worked for private household** a person who worked in a private household for pay, in cash or in kind. Examples are domestic helper, household cook, gardener, family driver, etc.
- **b.** Worked for private establishment a person who worked in a private establishment for pay, in cash or in kind. This class includes not only persons working for private industry but also those working for a religious group (priest, acolyte, missionary, nuns/sisters, etc.), unions and non-profit organizations.
- **c.** Worked for government/government corporation a person who worked for the government or a government corporation or any of its instrumentalities.
- **d. Self-employed without any employee** a person who worked for profit or fees in own business, farm, profession or trade without any paid employee.
- e. Employer in own family-operated farm or business a person who worked in his own business, farm, profession or trade and had one or more regular paid employees, including paid family members.

- f. Worked with pay in own family-operated farm or business a person who worked in own family-operated farm or business and receives cash or a fixed share of the produce as payment for his service.
- g. Worked without pay on own family-operated farm or business a member of the family who worked without pay in a farm or business operated by another family member. The room and board and any cash allowance given as incentives are not counted as compensation for these family workers.

**Family expenditures** - The expenses or disbursements made by the family purely for personal consumption. Therefore, it excludes all expenses in relation to farm or business operations, investment ventures, purchase of real property and other disbursements, which do not involve personal consumption.

**Proportion of families with access to safe water supply** – The ratio of the number of families who have access to water supply from community water system (piped into their dwelling, yard/plot or public tap) and protected wells to the total number of families.

**Proportion of families with sanitary toilet** – The ratio of the number of families with flush toilet (either owned or shared) and close pit to the total number of families.

**Proportion of families with owned or owner-like possession of housing units** – The ratio of the number of families with owned or amortized housing units to the total number of families.

**Proportion of families with houses made of strong materials** – The ratio to the total number of families of those families with houses having roofs and outer walls made of strong materials such as galvanized iron/aluminum, tile, concrete, brick stone and asbestos.

**Proportion of families with gainfully employed family head** – The ratio of the number of families with a family head who is gainfully employed to the total number of families.

**Proportion of families with gainfully employed members 18 years old and over** – The ratio of the number of families with gainfully employed members 18 years old and over to the total number of families with members 18 years old and over.

**Proportion of families with children 6-11 years old in elementary** – The ratio of the number of families with children 6-11 years old attending elementary school to the total number of families with children 6-11 years old.

**Proportion of families with children 12-15 years old in high school** – The ratio of the number of families with children 12-15 years old attending high school to the total number of families with children 12-15 years old.

# Background

**Proportion of families with members 5-17 years old who are working** – The ratio of the number of families with children 5-17 years old who are working to the total number of families with children 5-17 years old.

# Highlights of the 2010 APIS Results

The findings from this survey are presented using the Lowest 30% and Highest 70% income strata.

# A. Family Size and Characteristics of Family Heads

**Average Family Size** 

- As of July 2010, there were an estimated 18.8 million families in the country (Table 1).
- On the average, a family was composed of five persons. The average family size of the families in the bottom 30% income stratum was 6.2 persons compared to 4.5 persons for families in the upper 70% income stratum. The bottom 30% of families in this report represents the poor families.
- Across the regions, Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) registered the largest average family size at 6.1, while National Capital Region (NCR) registered the smallest at 4.6.
- In all regions, the average family size was bigger for families in the bottom 30% income stratum than those in the upper 70% income stratum.
- NCR had the largest average family size when the comparison is confined only to families in the bottom 30% income stratum, at 7.0 persons. On the other hand, Davao Region registered the smallest average family size at 5.6 persons.
- When the regional comparison is limited to the families in the upper 70% income stratum, ARMM registered the biggest average family size at 5.3 persons while MIMAROPA had the lowest average family size at 3.8 persons.




FIGURE 1. Average Family Size by Income Stratum, Philippines 2010

#### Age and Sex of Family Heads

- ❖ Female family heads were generally older than male family heads. About 54 percent of female heads were aged 55 and over compared to 31 percent among male heads (Table 2).
- ♦ Male heads for families in the upper 70% income stratum seemed to be older than for families in the bottom 30% income stratum. Almost one in three male heads in the upper 70% income stratum were aged 55 years or older while one in four male heads in the bottom 30% income stratum was of the same age group.




FIGURE 2. Family Heads by Age and Sex, Philippines 2010

# **Educational Attainment of Family Heads**

- Overall, four in five family heads did not reach college, that is, 19 percent of them were elementary undergraduates, 19 percent were elementary graduates, 11 percent were high school undergraduates and 22 percent were high school graduates. Only 3 percent had no grade completed (Table 2).
- Family heads who had some college education comprised 10 percent and those who graduated from college, 12 percent.

- ❖ Heads of the families belonging to the bottom 30% income stratum tend to be less educated compared to heads of families in the upper 70% income stratum. Two out of three (66%) family heads belonging to the bottom 30% income stratum had at most an elementary education. In comparison, 31 percent of family heads belonging to the upper 70% income stratum were of similar levels of education (no grade completed/pre-school, 1%; elementary undergraduates, 13%; and elementary graduates, 16%).
- Three out of 10 family heads in the upper 70% income stratum had attended college or higher level of education, while only 4 percent of family heads in the bottom 30% income stratum had attained that level of education.




FIGURE 3. Family Heads by Highest Grade Completed, Philippines 2010

# **Gainful Employment of Family Heads**

- ❖ In 2010, four out of five (82%) family heads were gainfully employed (Table 2). A person was gainfully employed if he/she had a job/business at anytime from January 1 to June 30, 2010.
- Male heads had a higher employment rate at 89 percent compared to female heads with only 58 percent.
- Family heads in the bottom 30% income stratum had a higher rate of employment (90%) compared to their counterpart in the upper 70% income stratum (79%). This pattern was observed both among male heads (94% for bottom 30% and 86% for upper 70%) and among female heads (68% for bottom 30% and 55% for upper 70%).




FIGURE 4. Gainfully Employed Heads by Sex and Income Stratum,

# **B.** Housing Characteristics

Tenure Status of Housing Unit and Lot

National Statistics Office

- ❖ At the national level, sixty-eight percent of families in the country owned the house and lot they occupied (Table 3). The remaining 32 percent occupied houses and lots under the following tenure: own house, rent-free lot with consent of owner (14%), rent house/room including lot (7%), rent-free house and lot with consent of owner (6%), own house, rent-free lot without consent of owner (3%), own house, rent lot (2%), or rent-free house and lot without consent of owner (less than one percent).
- Among the families in the bottom 30% income stratum, 63 percent owned their house and lot while among the upper 70% income stratum, 70 percent.





FIGURE 5. Families by Tenure Status of Housing Unit, Philippines 2010

- ❖ Among the regions, Western Visayas (46%) had the lowest percentage of families owning their house and lot.
- In NCR, one out of four families rented the house and lot they occupied.






#### Floor Area of Housing Unit

- Sixty-two percent of families in the country were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 49 square meters (sq. m.) (Table 4).
- Three out of 10 families were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. while 33 percent were in housing units with a floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m.
- Among the families in the bottom 30% income stratum, the largest proportion (46%) occupied

housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. One out of three families in this income stratum were living in housing units with a floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m.


- Families belonging to the upper 70% income stratum were living in housing units with a larger floor area. Forty-five percent of the families in the upper 70% income stratum lived in housing units with a floor area of at least 50 sq. m. compared to 17 percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ Almost half (48%) of families in the bottom 30% income stratum in ARMM had housing units with floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m. Thirty-six percent of families in the upper 70% income stratum in Zamboanga Peninsula were living in housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m.

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#### Type of Building/House

- Ninety-five percent of Filipino families were residing in single houses (Table 5). The other families dwelt in either apartment/accessoria/condominium/townhouse (4%), duplex houses (2%), or commercial/industrial/agricultural building (less than one percent).
- ❖ In NCR, 15 percent were living in apartments, accessoria, condominiums or townhouses. Families living in single houses are about 83 percent.


FIGURE 8. Families by Type of Building/House they Reside, Philippines 2010




#### Construction Materials of the Roof and Outer Walls

- ❖ The majority of Filipino houses had roofs and outer walls made of strong materials. About 80 percent of families had houses with strong roofs and 69 percent had strong outer walls (Tables 6 and 7). Strong materials for roof and outer walls refer to galvanized iron or aluminum, tile, concrete, brick stone or asbestos while light materials refer to cogon, nipa or anahaw.
- As expected, a larger proportion of families in the upper 70% income stratum had housing units made of strong roofs (88%) and outer walls (79%) compared to families in the bottom 30% income stratum (62% and 44%, respectively).

- Among the regions, Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) recorded the highest percentage of families living in houses with strong roofs and outer walls (94% and 89%, respectively). On the other hand, ARMM had the lowest percentage of families living in houses that used strong materials for their roofs (51%) and outer walls (42%).
- ❖ One in four families in the bottom 30% income stratum were living in houses with roofs made of light materials (26%) and three in 10 families (32%) were living in houses with outer walls which are light materials.






# Electricity

- ❖ Of the 18.8 million families, 87 percent families had electricity in their homes (Table 8). About 95 percent of families in the upper 70% income stratum had electricity in their homes compared to 69 percent in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ In NCR, 99 percent of families had electricity in their homes. Central Luzon was next to NCR in terms of families having electricity in their houses at 97 percent. The most disadvantaged region was ARMM where 42 percent of families had no electricity in their homes.
- In the regions, proportions of families with electricity in their homes remarkably differ between the two income strata.

#### **Main Source of Water Supply**

- Overall, eighty-five percent of the total families had access to a safe source of water supply (Table 8). Considered as clean and safe sources of water supply are community water system and protected well.
- ❖ The remaining 15 percent of families obtained their water from sources considered unsafe, such as unprotected well (5%), developed spring (4%), undeveloped spring (2%), river, stream, pond, lake or dam (1%), rainwater (less than one percent), and tanker truck or peddler (3%).

- Seven out of 10 families that belong to the bottom 30% income stratum had access to safe water compared to nine in 10 families in the upper 70% income stratum.
- Four regions in Luzon had over 90 percent of their families with access to safe water. These are Central Luzon (97%), Cagayan Valley (96%), NCR (95%) and Ilocos (94%).
- ❖ In ARMM, less than half (44%) of the families had access to safe water.




FIGURE 11. Families by Main Source of Water Supply, Philippines 2010

# Toilet Facility

- At the national level, the proportion of Filipino families with sanitary toilets was 93 percent (Table 9). For this survey, sanitary toilet refers to flush toilet (either owned or shared) and close pit type of toilet facility.
- Other families used open pit (2%), drop or overhang (1%) and pail system (less than one percent), which are considered unsanitary toilets. There were 5 percent families with no toilet facilities in their homes.
- ❖ Families in the bottom 30% income stratum were more likely to use an unsanitary toilet than families in the upper 70% income stratum. More so, the percentage of families in the bottom 30% income stratum without sanitary toilet at home is 19 percent compared to 3 percent among families in the upper 70%.

• One in four (27%) families in ARMM had no sanitary toilet.





FIGURE 12. Families by Type of Toilet Facility Used, Philippines 2010

#### **Household Conveniences**

- ❖ Television was the most visible household appliance in Filipino homes. Three out of four families owned this (Table 10). Television was the most common appliance for the upper 70% income stratum (87%) while cellular phone for the bottom 30% income stratum (49%).
- Cellular phone was the second most popular household convenience with 73 percent of families in the country having at least one member owning this.
- ❖ Television and cellular phone were the leading household conveniences in the regions.
- ❖ Motorized boat/banca (3%), video cassette player/recorder (8%) and car/jeep/van (9%) were the least common household conveniences. This is true for the upper 70% income stratum. The percentages of ownership of motorized boat/banca, video cassette player/recorder and car/jeep/van in this income stratum were 3, 11, and 12 percent, respectively.
- ❖ For the bottom 30% income stratum, aircon, car/jeep/van and personal computer (less than one percent) were the least common household conveniences.

FIGURE 13. Percentage of Families Owning Household Conveniences, Philippines 2010




#### C. Education

#### Highest Grade Completed of Population 5 Years and Over

- One-fourth of persons 5 years old and over were elementary undergraduates (Table 11).
- Persons 5 years old and over in the upper 70% income stratum are more highly educated than their counterpart in the bottom 30% income stratum. In 2010, of the population 5 years old and over in the upper 70% income stratum, 28 percent had reached college compared to only 5 percent for the bottom 30% income stratum.
- In the bottom 30% income stratum, the elementary undergraduates comprised the largest percentage (35%) followed by high school undergraduates (17%) and elementary graduates (16%).
- In NCR, Ilocos, Central Luzon and CALABARZON, the biggest percentage of persons 5 years old and over were high school graduates, with the percentage ranging from 23 to 24 percent. In other regions, the largest percentage of persons 5 years old and over were elementary undergraduates, ranging from 23 percent in CAR and Cagayan Valley to 32 percent in Zamboanga Peninsula and ARMM.

- In NCR, 34 percent of persons 5 years old and over had gone to college, that is, 16 percent were college undergraduates and 18 percent were college graduates or higher.
- In ARMM, one in 5 persons five years old and over has never been to school.






#### **Schooling Status**

- The cut-off age for school attendance is 3 years old to measure attendance in early childhood learning schools like nursery, kindergarten and preparatory schools. School refers to formal schools including vocational/technical schools offering post-secondary courses. A person who was in school during the time of interview is considered as attending school.
- The population 3 to 24 years of age, which numbered approximately 44.6 million in July 2010, constituted almost half (47%) of the total population in the country (Table 12).

- The total enrolled as of July 2010 numbered to some 29 million or 65 percent of total persons of schooling ages, that is, ages 3 to 24 years.
- Two out of three persons aged 3 to 24 years in both income strata were attending school, that is, 63 percent in the bottom 30% income stratum and 67 percent in the upper 70% income stratum.
- ❖ Those attending school comprised mainly of the age group 6 to 9 years (28%) and the age group 10 to 12 years (24%).


FIGURE 15. Population 3 to 24 Years Old Who Were Attending School During School Year 2010-2011 by Schooling Age and Income Stratum, Philippines 2010



- Among the regions, CAR, NCR and Ilocos registered the highest percentage of school attendees at 69 percent while ARMM had the lowest percentage at 58 percent.
- ♦ About the same proportion of females 3 to 24 years old (67%) and males 3 to 24 years old (64%) were attending school.
- ❖ Persons of school age in the upper 70% income stratum were more likely to pursue higher education compared to those in the bottom 30% income stratum. While 18 percent of the school age population in the upper 70% income stratum were attending college or post graduate schools, the corresponding proportion in the bottom 30% income stratum is 4 percent (Table 13).

❖ In nine out of 17 regions, the proportion of persons of school age who were attending college was below the national average of 12 percent. These were Northern Mindanao (11%), Davao (11%), Caraga (10%), Bicol (10%), Eastern Visayas (9%), MIMAROPA (9%), SOCCSKSARGEN (9%), Zamboanga Peninsula (8%) and ARMM (10%).


#### Reasons for not Attending School

- ❖ There were approximately 12.1 million persons 6 to 24 years old who were out of school in school year 2010-2011 (June 2010 to March/April 2011) or in the first semester June 2010 to October 2010 (Table 14).
- ❖ The most frequently cited reasons for not attending school were employment/looking for work (25%), high cost of education (23%) and lack of personal interest (20%). These are also the most common reasons reported for those not attending school in both income strata.
- ❖ For 10 percent of persons 6 to 24 years, completed schooling was the reason cited for not attending school and they have finished at least post-secondary courses or 2-year course in college.

#### Highlights of the 2010 APIS Results

- Lack of personal interest (28%), employment/looking for work (28%), and high cost of education (24%) were the top reasons why males were not attending school.
- ❖ A slightly different pattern was observed among females where marriage, rather than lack of personal interest, in addition to employment and high cost of education kept most of the females out of schools.
- ❖ Though ARMM had higher percentage of persons attending college compared to most of the regions, it has the lowest percentage (5%) of persons in schooling ages who were reported to have finished schooling hence were not attending schools. The corresponding proportion in other regions ranges from 6 percent to 19 percent.


FIGURE 17. Population 6 to 24 Years Old Who Were Not Attending School during School Year 2010-2011 by Reason for Not Attending School and Income Stratum, Philippines 2010



#### Children in Elementary Grade

- ❖ A total of 7.9 million families had children aged 6 to 11 years (Table 15). Of this number, 7.5 million or 95 percent had children in this age group who were in elementary grades.
- Similarly, among families in the upper 70% income stratum with children 6 to 11 years old, 95 percent were with children in that age group who were in elementary grades, while for the bottom 30% income stratum, the proportion was 94 percent.
- ARMM posted the lowest percentage (85%) of families with children 6 to 11 years old who were enrolled in elementary. It is the only region with a proportion of less than 90 percent. SOCCSKSARGEN registered the highest percentage at 98 percent.


FIGURE 18. Percentage of Families with Children 6 to 11 Years Old Who Were in Elementary Grades, by Income Stratum, Philippines 2010



#### Children in High School

- Of the 6.5 million families with children aged 12 to 15 years, 73 percent or 4.7 million families were reported having children in this age bracket who were in high school (Table 16).
- Three Luzon regions namely NCR, Ilocos and CAR, registered the highest proportion of families with children 12 to 15 years old attending high school with corresponding percentages of 83 percent, 80 percent and 80 percent.

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#### D. Economic Characteristics

#### Families with Working Members 18 Years Old and Over

- There were 18.8 million families with members aged 18 years and over (Table 17). Of this number, 93 percent or 17.5 million families were reported having members in this age bracket who were gainfully employed.





FIGURE 21. Among families with members 18-24, the percentage with members 18-24 who were studying and percentage with members 18-24 who were gainfully employed, and among families with members 25 years and over, the percentage with members 25 years and over who were gainfully employed, NCR 2010

- ❖ In all regions, the proportion of families with members aged 18 years and over who were gainfully employed was higher for the bottom 30% income stratum than for the upper 70% income stratum (Figures 20 & 21). This is because families in the bottom 30% income stratum are more likely to have members 25 years and over who engage in an economic activity compared to families in the upper 70% income stratum. Also, families in the bottom 30% income stratum are more likely to have members aged 18 to 24 who are employed rather than in schools.

#### Families with Working Children 5-17 Years Old


- The Labor Code of the Philippines specifies that no child below 18 years old shall be employed except when he/she works directly under the sole responsibility of his parents/guardian and his/her employment does not in any way interfere with his/her schooling. Although the survey results would not show whether the conditions stated above are met, it would show the extent or magnitude of families whose children below 18 years old are working.
- Of the 12.1 million families with members aged 5 to 17 years, 11 percent or 1.3 million families were reported to have working children (Table 18).
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income stratum, 18 percent of families with members 5 to 17 years old had working children while for the upper 70% income stratum, only 8 percent of such families was reported to have working children.
- Among regions, Zamboanga Peninsula had the highest percentage of families with members 5-17 years old who were gainfully employed (18.0%), followed by Bicol (17.6%), MIMAROPA (17.2%) and Northern Mindanao (17.2%). In NCR, only 2 percent of such families had working children.

❖ In all regions, except in NCR, there was a high percentage of families in the bottom 30% income stratum with working children, ranging from 10 percent to 29 percent.

#### **Families Engaged in Any Economic Activity**

- ❖ There are three major economic activities that contribute to a family's income. These are wages and salary, family sustenance activities and entrepreneurial activities. Other sources of income include net share of crops, cash receipts both from abroad and domestic source, rentals, interest, pension, dividends, etc.
- ❖ In 2010, the number of families with at least one member reported to have engaged in any type of economic activity in the 6 months preceding the survey was 18.0 million (Table 19). Wage and salary workers accounted for 68 percent; those engaged in entrepreneurial activity, 61 percent; and those engaged in family sustenance activity, 52 percent. For this report, more than one economic activity can be reported for one family.
- ❖ In the bottom 30% income among families stratum, engaged in an economic activity in the 6 months prior to the survey, 80 percent involved in family were sustenance and 69 percent in activities. entrepreneurial Families with wage and salary earning members comprised 63 percent. In the upper 70% income stratum, the largest proportion (71%) of families with members engaged in an economic activity members who were salary and wage earners.

FIGURE 22. Percentage of Families Engaged in any Type of Economic Activity, Philippines 2010




- ❖ Among the families engaged in an economic activity in Cagayan Valley, 85 percent were involved in family sustenance activities. On the other hand, the percentage of families engaged in family sustenance activities in NCR accounted for two percent.
- In ARMM, 91 percent of families engaged in an economic activity had entrepreneurial activities.
- ❖ A large proportion of the families in all regions had members who were salary and wage workers, except for ARMM with only 22 percent.

## **Employed Persons 5 Years Old and Over by Class of Worker**

- Among employed persons in 2010 which numbered around 39.3 million, the largest proportion (57%) were wage and salary workers, followed by self-employed without any employee at 28 percent (Table 20). Wage and salary workers include those who worked for private households, private establishments and government offices and those who worked with pay in own family-operated farm or business. Unpaid family workers comprised of 12 percent. Employer in own family-operated farm or business had the least percentage at 3 percent. Similar pattern was observed in all regions except in ARMM.
- ❖ In ARMM, half of employed persons were self-employed without any employee and one in three employed persons were unpaid family workers. Only 15 percent were wage and salary workers.
- ❖ The largest proportion of employed persons in the bottom 30% income stratum and upper 70% income stratum were wage and salary workers with corresponding percentages of 49 percent and 61 percent.

# E. Family's Health

#### Illness/Injury Work-Related

- There were 13.6 million persons 5 years old and over or 16 percent of the population 5 years and older who got ill or injured one month prior to the conduct of the survey in 2010 (Table 21). Of this number, 15 percent had work-related illness/injury.
- Of population 5 years and older who got ill or injured one month before the survey, the proportion of those whose ailments or injuries were work related was higher in nine regions compared to the national average. These regions were Cagayan Valley (29%), Eastern Visayas (23%), SOCCSKSARGEN (21%), Davao (18%), Bicol (17%), Central Luzon (16%), MIMAROPA (16%), Northern Mindanao (16%), and Caraga (16%).


# Acquisition of House and/or Lot thru the Assistance of Government Housing or Financing Program

- Only 3 percent of total families or 470 thousand families had members who acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program (Table 22).
- Among the regions, CALABARZON had the highest percentage of families who acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program at 5 percent.
- Thirty-six percent of families have acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program in 1991 or earlier (Table 23). In 1992-1998, 24 percent of total families have acquired a house and/or lot thru government housing or financing program, 12 percent in 1999-2000 and 23 percent in 2001-2008.

# Acquisition of Agricultural Land Under the CARP Land-Distribution Program

- About 22 percent or 4.1 million families owned a land used for agricultural purposes (Table 24). Of this number, 10 percent had acquired their agricultural lands under the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) land-distribution program.
- Three in 10 (28%) families in the bottom 30% income stratum owned a land used for agricultural purposes compared to one in five (19%) families among the upper 70% income stratum.

Nine percent of families in the bottom 30% income stratum who owned lands used for agricultural purposes had acquired their lands under the CARP. The corresponding percentage among families in the upper 70% income stratum is 10 percent.



- Six percent of families had experienced hunger 3 months prior to the conduct of the survey (Table 25).
- ❖ In the upper 70% income stratum, 3 percent of the families experienced hunger during the cited period while in the bottom 30% income stratum, 13 percent.
- ❖ In NCR, two out of five (38%) families in the bottom 30% income stratum had experienced hunger.
- CAR had reported the lowest incidence of hunger, with less than one percent of their families said to have experienced hunger 3 months preceding the survey.
- Among families who experienced hunger 3 months prior to the survey, two in five families experienced hunger at least once in each month (37%) and at least once in three months (40%). The proportion of families who experienced hunger at least once in each week is 23 percent.

### F. Family Income and Expenditure

# Total Family Income

- ❖ The total family income for the period January to June 2010 reached Php 1.8 trillion (Table 26). Almost 90 percent of this income or Php 1.60 trillion was earned by the families belonging to the upper 70% income stratum.
- The largest percentage (44%) of total family income was from salaries and wages. Income from entrepreneurial activities accounted for 24 percent of the total family income. A considerable percentage (31%) of the total family income was derived from other sources.
- Almost three-fourths of the Php 213 billion earned by families in the bottom 30% income stratum was contributed by wage and salary workers (39%) and those with entrepreneurial activities (34%).

#### Highlights of the 2010 APIS Results

- ❖ Forty-five percent of the total income of the upper 70% income stratum came from salaries and wages while 22 percent was from entrepreneurial activities and 33 percent from other sources.
- ❖ In all regions except ARMM, the biggest share of total family income came from salaries and wages. In ARMM, the largest percentage (57%) of total family income came from entrepreneurial activities.
- The average family income, computed by dividing the total income for the period by the total number of families, amounted to Php 96,629 (Table 28). The average family income for the bottom 30% income stratum was Php 37,817 while Php 121,837 for the upper 70% income stratum.


#### Family Expenditure and Savings

- ❖ Total family expenditure from January 1 to June 30, 2010 amounted to Php 1.6 trillion (Table 27). The total family savings for the same period was estimated at Php 195.2 billion.
- ❖ Families in the upper 70% income stratum had a saving of Php 204.1 billion.
- ❖ Meanwhile, families in the bottom 30% income stratum disbursed Php 8.9 billion. This income group spent more than what they have earned. This is true for bottom 30% income stratum in all regions except Cagayan Valley and Northern Mindanao.
- NCR and CALABARZON, which had the biggest income, recorded the largest savings.
- ARMM reported the highest deficit of Php 2.1 billion in the bottom 30% income stratum.
- ❖ The average family expenditure at the national level was Php 86,247, Php 39,399 for the bottom 30% income stratum and Php 106,327 for the upper 70% income stratum (Table 28).

#### Average Per Capita Income and Average Per Capita Expenditure

- Average per capita income is computed by dividing the total income for the period by the total population. Likewise, average per capita expenditure equals total expenditure divided by total population.
- ❖ The average per capita income for the period January 1 to June 30, 2010 was about Php 19,300 (Table 29). The average per capita income for the bottom 30% income stratum was Php 6,100 while Php 27,100 for the upper 70% income stratum.

- ❖ On the other hand, the average per capita expenditure at the national level was Php 17,200, Php 6,300 for the bottom 30% income stratum and Php 23,700 for the upper 70% income stratum.
- NCR reported the highest per capita income (Php 36,100) and per capita expenditure (Php 33,600).
- ARMM had a per capita income of Php 9,800; it is the only region with a value of less than Php 10,000. ARMM also recorded the lowest average per capita expenditure at Php 9,400.




