




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

FOREWORD

This report presents the final results of the 2012 Family Income and Expenditure Survey (FIES). The survey adopted the 2009 Philippine Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (PCOICOP). The 2009 PCOICOP is the first standard classification of individual consumption expenditure in the country prepared by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB) in collaboration with concerned agencies in the Philippine Statistical System (PSS). The 2009 PCOICOP was patterned after the 1999 Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (COICOP) issued by the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD).

The 2012 FIES is a sample survey designed to provide income and expenditure data for the country and its seventeen (17) regions. These data are the basic sources of information on human development and the basis of the policies and programs of the government to improve the socio-economic conditions of the Filipino people.

The survey was conducted in two separate rounds using separate questionnaires with the same set of questions. The first was conducted in July 2012 and the second was in January 2013. For each round, the reference period was the half-year period preceding the survey.

The National Statistics Office (NSO) extends its sincerest gratitude to its personnel and enumerators for their countless determination and commitment to make this nationwide survey a success. The NSO also expresses its gratitude to the respondents of this survey for their cooperation to provide vital information on income and expenditures.

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EXPLANATO RYTEXT

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Objectives of the Survey

The 2012 Family Income and Expenditure Survey (FIES) had the following primary objectives:

- 1) to gather data on family income and family expenditure and related information affecting income and expenditure levels and patterns in the Philippines
- 2) to determine the sources of income and income distribution, levels of living and spending patterns, and the degree of inequality among families
- to provide benchmark information to update weights for the estimation of consumer price index and
- 4) to provide information for the estimation of the country's poverty threshold and incidence.

B. Authority for the Survey and Confidentiality of Data

The authority for the survey emanates from Commonwealth Act (CA) No. 591, which authorized the National Statistics Office (NSO), under Section 2(d), "to conduct by enumeration, sampling or other methods, for statistical purposes, studies of social and economic problems of the country".

More recently, Executive Order No. 121 otherwise known as the Reorganization Act of the Philippine Statistical System, which was passed on January 30, 1987, declared that the NSO shall be the major statistical agency responsible for generating general purpose statistics and for undertaking such censuses and surveys as may be designated by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB).

Like all other surveys undertaken by the NSO, the data gathered in the 2012 FIES are held STRICTLY CONFIDENTIAL. Data are used for statistical purposes only and published in summary forms. As provided for in Section 4 of CA 591, the data will not be used for taxation, investigation or enforcement purposes.

C. Scope and Coverage

Data gathered in the survey included sources of income in cash and in kind and the level of consumption by item of expenditure. Related information such as family size, number of family members employed for pay or profit (wage/salary or own-account workers), occupation, age and educational attainment of household head, and housing characteristics were also included.

The survey involved the interview of a national sample of about 50,000 households deemed sufficient to provide reliable estimates of income and expenditure at the national and regional level. The sample households covered in the survey were the same households interviewed in the July 2012 and January 2013 rounds of the Labor Force Survey (LFS).

The reporting unit was the household which implies that the statistics emanating from this survey referred to the characteristics of the population residing in private households. Institutional population is not within the scope of the survey.

For FIES, the concept of family was used. A family consists of the household head, spouse, unmarried children, ever-married children, son-in-law or daughter-in-law, parents of the head or spouse and other relatives who are members of the household.

In addition, two or more persons not related to each other by blood, marriage or adoption is also considered in this survey. However, only the income and expenditure of the member who is considered as the household head is included.

II. SURVEY DESIGN

A. Population Coverage

The 2012 FIES has as its target population, all households and members of households nationwide. A household is defined as an aggregate of persons, generally but not necessarily bound by ties of kinship, who live together under the same roof and eat together or share in common the household food. Household membership comprises the head of the household, relatives living with him or her such as spouse, children, parent, brother or sister, son- or daughter-in-law, grandson or granddaughter and other relatives. Household membership likewise includes boarders, domestic helpers and non-relatives. A person who lives alone is considered a separate household.

Excluded in the target population are households in the least accessible barangays (LABs). A barangay is classified as LAB if; (a) it requires more than eight hours walk from the last vehicle station; or (b) the frequency of transportation is less than three times a week; or (c) the cost of a one-way trip is more than five hundred pesos. A total of 350 barangays were classified as LABs. This number accounts for only 0.83 percent of the total number of households in these areas account for only 0.38 percent of the total number of households.

B. Sampling Design

The 2012 FIES used the sampling design of the 2003 Master Sample (MS) for household surveys.

1. Domain

The 2003 MS considered the country's 17 administrative regions as defined in Executive Orders (EO) 36 and 131 as the sampling domains. A domain is referred to as a subdivision of the country for which estimates with adequate level of precision are generated. It must be noted that while there is a demand for data at the provincial level (and to some extent municipal and barangay levels), the provinces were not treated as sampling domains because there are more than 80 provinces. Defining provinces as sample domains would entail a much larger sample size and resource requirement for the implementation of the survey. Below are the 17 administrative regions of the country:

2. Sampling Frame

As in most household surveys, the 2003 MS made use of an area sample design. For this purpose, the Enumeration Area Reference File (EARF) of the 2000 Census of Population and Housing (CPH) was utilized as sampling frame. The EARF contains the number of households by enumeration area (EA) in each barangay.

This frame was used to form the primary sampling units (PSUs). With consideration of the period for which the 2003 MS will be in use, the PSUs were formed or defined as a barangay or a combination of barangays with at least 500 households.

3. Stratification

The 2003 MS considered the 17 regions of the country as the primary strata. Within each region, further stratification was performed using geographic groupings such as provinces, highly urbanized cities (HUCs), and independent component cities (ICCs). Within each of these substrata formed within regions, the PSUs were further stratified, to the extent possible, using the proportion of strong houses (PSTRONG), indicator of engagement in agriculture of the area (AGRI), and a measure of per capita income (PERCAPITA) as stratification factors.

PSTRONG is defined to be the percentage of occupied housing units that are classified as made of strong materials for both the roof and outer walls, based on the data from the 2000 CPH. A roof is considered made of strong materials if it is made of galvanized iron, aluminum, concrete or clay tile, half galvanized-half concrete, or asbestos. An outer wall is considered made of strong materials if it is made of concrete, brick, stone, wood, half concrete-half wood, galvanized iron, asbestos or glass.

AGRI was determined in the following way: initially, an indicator variable was computed at the barangay level. That variable has a value of 1 if more than 50 percent of the households in the barangay were engaged in agriculture or fisheries and 0 otherwise, based on the 2000 CPH Barangay Schedule. To obtain a measure at the PSU level, a weighted average of the barangay indicator variable was computed for all the barangays within the PSU, weighted by the total number of households in the barangay. Thus, the value of AGRI at the PSU level lies between 0 and 1.

PERCAPITA is defined as the total income of the municipality divided by the total population in that municipality. Note that the PERCAPITA value of the PSUs is the same if the PSUs belong to the same municipality. The data on municipal income refer to year 2000 and were taken from the Department of Finance. However, if the 2000 municipal income was not reported to the Bureau of Local Government Finance (BLGF), 2001 income was used. If no 2000 or 2001 municipal income was reported, the income classification from the BLGF for this municipality was obtained. Using the data on municipal income, which are presented in income intervals, the average of the lower and the upper values of the income interval for the municipal class to which this municipality belongs were determined.

4. Sample Selection

The 2003 MS consisted of 2,835 PSUs. The entire MS was divided into four subsamples or independent replicates, such as a quarter sample contains one-fourth of the total PSUs; a half sample contains one-half of the four sub-samples or equivalent to all PSUs in two replicates.

The final number of sample PSUs for each domain was determined by first classifying PSUs as either self-representing (SR) or non-self-representing (NSR). In addition, to facilitate the selection of sub-samples, the total number of NSR PSUs in each region was adjusted to make it a multiple of four.

SR PSU refers to a very large PSU in the region/domain with a selection probability of approximately one or higher and is outright included in the MS; it is properly treated as a stratum; also known as certainty PSU. NSR PSU refers to a regular- to small-sized PSU in a region or domain; also known as non certainty PSU. The 2003 MS consists of 330 certainty PSUs and 2,505 non-certainty PSUs.

To have some control over the sub-sample size, the PSUs were selected with probability proportional to some estimated measure of size. The size measure refers to the total number of households from the 2000 CPH. Because of the wide variation in PSU sizes, PSUs with selection probabilities greater than one were identified and were included in the sample as certainty selections.

At the second stage, EAs were selected within sampled PSUs, and at the third stage, housing units were selected within sampled EAs. Generally, all households in sampled housing units were enumerated, except for few cases when the number of households in a housing unit exceeds three. In which case, a sample of three households in a sampled housing unit was selected at random with equal probability.

An EA is defined as an area with discernable boundaries within barangays consisting of about 150 contiguous households. These EAs were identified during the 2000 CPH. A housing unit, on the other hand, is a structurally separate and independent place of abode which, by the way it has been constructed, converted, or arranged, is intended for habitation by a household.

5. Sample Size

The 2012 FIES involved the interview of a national sample of about 50,000 sample households. This is deemed sufficient to provide reliable estimates on family income and expenditure, and related information affecting the income and expenditure levels and patterns in the Philippines, both at the national and regional level. The sample households covered in the survey were the same households interviewed in the July 2012 and January 2013 rounds of the LFS.

C. Estimation Procedure

In the 2003 MS design, the probability that a household was included in the sample varied across domains or regions. However, the sampling design is *epsem* within domain (i.e. equal selection probabilities within region). The initial step in the construction of weights is to determine the unit's base weight. This is defined as the inverse of its selection probabilities. The base weight is further adjusted to take into account possible non-response and possibly to make the estimates conform to some known population totals.

1. Base Weights

In general, the base weight assigned to a sampled unit is the inverse of its selection probability. In particular, the base weight is computed as the inverse of equations 1 (NSR) and 2 (SR) below:

Note that the last term will equal to 1.0 in cases when all households in the sampled housing unit are enumerated. That is, when households per housing unit do not exceed three.

2. Non-response Adjustments

All surveys experienced some degree of unit or total non-response in which a sampled and eligible unit fails to participate in the survey (for example, the unit may refuse to participate, or may never be at home at times the interviewer calls). Adjustments are made to the base weights to compensate for non-response by sampled units eligible for the survey. In essence, the adjustment inflates the base weights of "similar" responding units to compensate for each non-responding unit.

The most common form of non-response weighting adjustment is a weighting class adjustment and that is the type of adjustment being used for surveys based on the 2003 MS. The full sample of responding households and non-responding households is divided into a number of weighting classes or cells and non-response adjustment factors are computed for each cell c as

The denominator of w_c is the sum of the weights of responding households (indexed r) in cell c. The numerator adds together the sum of the weights for responding households and the sum of the weights for eligible non-responding households (indexed m for missing) in cell c. Together these two sums in the numerator give the sum of the weights for the total eligible sample (indexed s) in cell c. Thus, the non-response weight adjustment w_c is the inverse of the weighted response rate in cell c. Note that the adjustment is applied with eligible units. Ineligible sampled units (e.g., vacant or demolished housing units and units whether are out of scope for a given survey) are excluded.

3. Population Weighting Adjustments

The basic weight for the sample households for the 2012 FIES can be expressed as an inverse of the selection probability described in equations 1 and 2. Hence, the base weight for a sampled household in domain d in a housing unit in which all households are included is

The basic weight was adjusted to take into account household non-interviews, followed by an adjustment based on the household projections for the domain.

Generally, weighted sample distributions do not conform to known population distributions (e.g. projected population counts). In particular, sample estimates of population counts generally fall short of the true population counts because of non-coverage.

Hence, further weighting adjustments, termed as population weighting adjustment, may be made to compensate for non-coverage, and to make the survey estimates based on the adjusted weight estimates consistent with known population distributions.

For adjusting household level estimates, the reference count of households is obtained by dividing the total projected population by the average household size. This is resorted to in the absence of the projected number of households.

4. Final Survey Weight

The final survey weight assigned to each responding unit is computed as the product of the base weight, the non-response adjustment and the population weighting adjustment (in the case of households as responding unit – the household population weighting adjustment).

For FIES, a ratio of 1:1 is observed or one family to one household. Consider first the estimation of total households. Let \mathcal{Y}_i and w_i denote the value of variable \mathcal{Y} and the final weight for household i. The notation can be applied to persons or households or any other unit of analysis. The final weight w_i can be viewed as the number of households that household i represents; thus $\sum w_i$ estimates the total number of households in the country N. The survey estimate of the households total for variable y, denoted by Y, is then simply

D. Questionnaire Design

The FIES questionnaire consists of 78 pages and has six main parts as follows: Part I– Identification and Other Information; Part II– Expenditures and Other Disbursements; Part III– Housing Characteristic; Part IV– Social Protection; Part V– Income and Other Receipts; and Part VI– Entrepreneurial Activities.

Starting 2012 FIES, the survey adopted the 2009 Philippine Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (PCOICOP). The 2009 PCOICOP is the first standard classification of individual consumption expenditure in the country prepared by the National Statistical Coordination Board (NSCB) in collaboration with concerned agencies in the Philippine Statistical System (PSS). The 2009 PCOICOP was patterned after the 1999 Classification of Individual Consumption According to Purpose (COICOP) issued by the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD).

The design permits to obtain the family transaction for one semester in every visit (two enumeration periods) using one set of questionnaire for each visit. The use of separate questionnaires with the same set of questions for both visits started in 2003 FIES. In previous FIES, the same set of questions for each semester (two enumeration periods) were contained in one questionnaire.

E. Method of Data Collection

The samples are interviewed in two separate operations using a separate questionnaire with the same set of questions, each time using the half-year period preceding the interview as reference period. This scheme which was utilized to improve the quality of gathered data minimizes the respondent's memory bias, and at the same time, captures the seasonality of income and expenditure pattern. The first phase of survey operation was conducted in July 2012 and gathered data were for the period January 1 to June 30, 2012. The second operation was conducted in January 2013 and gathered information for the period July 1 to December 31, 2012.

In 2012 FIES, the concept of "average week" consumption for all food items was also utilized to further reduce the memory bias. Moreover, the reference period for sections on Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and other Fuels, Transport, Communication, and Miscellaneous Goods and Services was not limited to the "past month" consumption; in some cases, the concept of "average month" consumption was used. The reference period used for all other expenditure group is the "past six months".

Estimates of income and expenditures in kind such as food items received as gifts, and rental value of owner-occupied house are based on prevailing market prices or rental value in the locality.

F. Data Processing System

The 2012 FIES questionnaire contained about 800 data items and a summary for comparing income and expenditures. The questionnaires were subjected to a rigorous manual and machine edit checks for completeness, arithmetic accuracy, range validity and internal consistency.

The major steps in the machine processing are as follows:

1. Data entry

4. Consistency and macro edit (big edit)

2. Completeness check

5. Generation of the Public Use File (PUF)

3. Matching of visit records

6. Tabulation

Steps 1, 2 and 4 were done right after each visit. The remaining steps were carried out only after the second visit had been completed.

Steps 1 to 4 were done at the Regional Office, while Steps 2 to 6 were completed in the Central Office.

After completing Steps 1 to 4, data files were transmitted to the Central Office where a summary file was generated. The summary file was used to produce the consistency tables as well as the preliminary and textual tables.

When the generated tables showed inconsistencies, selected data items were subjected to further scrutiny and validation. The cycle of generation of consistency tables and data validation were done until questionable data items were verified.

The FIES Computer-Aided Consistency and Macro Editing (FAME), an interactive Windows-based application system, was used in processing the survey data starting 2000 FIES round. The interactive module of FAME enabled the following activities to be done simultaneously:

- Matching of visit records
- 2. Consistency and macro edit (big edit)
- 3. Range check

The improved system minimized the processing time. The need for paper to generate the reject listing was also minimized, if not eliminated.

G. Survey Non-response

As in all surveys, two types of non-response were encountered in the 2012 FIES: interview non-response and item non-response. Interview non-response refers to a sample household that could not be interviewed. Since the survey requires that the sample households be interviewed in both visits, the following cases contributed to interview non-response: households that transferred to another dwelling unit; those that were temporarily away, on vacation, or not at home during the second visit; those who refused to be interviewed; and those located in housing units that were already demolished or destroyed due to fire or typhoon.

Note: The response rate is the ratio of the total responding households to the total number of eligible households. Eligible households include households who were: completely interviewed; refused to be interviewed; temporarily away, not at home or on vacation; and those located in critical or flooded areas during the survey period.

Item non-response, or failure to obtain responses to particular survey items, resulted from the following factors: respondents being unaware of the answer or unwilling to provide the requested information in a particular question, or ENs' omission of questions during the interview. Deterministic imputation was done to address item non-response. This imputation is a process in which proper entry for a particular missing item was deduced based from responses to other items of the same questionnaire where the non-response item was observed. Notes and remarks indicated in the questionnaire were likewise used as basis for imputation.

III. LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA

The user of the data presented in this report should bear in mind that the data are the results of a sample survey and, accordingly, are subject to sampling variations because observations were not taken from the entire population.

Survey estimates may also be affected by non-sampling errors such as deliberate under or over reporting of income and expenditures, or reluctance on the part of the respondents to reveal their true levels of income or expenditures.

Moreover, considering that both cash and non-cash expenditures and income are gathered in the FIES, valuation of non-cash income and expenditures may pose some problems. The instructions are to use market prices prevailing in the locality for goods and services received as gifts, and farm gate prices for goods consumed from own production.

Also, although FIES is a rider to the LFS, matching during data processing was limited to the demographic characteristics of household heads.


Starting 2003, a new MS design was used with regions as domains. The number of samples increased from 41,000 to around 50,000 sample households. Careful evaluation must be made in comparing the results of the 2012 FIES with other FIES results prior to the implementation of the new MS design.

Further, the 2012 FIES estimates are compared with previous FIES results using real terms. To be able to do this, the effects of inflation have to be removed. For comparative purposes, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) is used to deflate the 2012 FIES estimates. The deflator for the 2012 FIES estimates is obtained by dividing the 2012 CPI by the 2006 CPI. To express the 2012 FIES estimates in 2006 prices, the values are then divided by the quotient of the two CPIs.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2012 FIES RESULTS


Increase in income of Filipino families is minimal

- In 2012, Filipino families had an annual income of 235 thousand pesos, on average. In comparison, their expenditure for the same year was 193 thousand pesos, on average.
- On the other hand, in 2009, Filipino families earned 208 thousand pesos yearly, on average, and spent 177 thousand pesos yearly, on average.
- Using the 2006 prices in order to make the 2009 and 2012 figures comparable, the average annual family income in 2012 would be valued at 180 thousand pesos, while the average annual family expenditure would be valued at 148 thousand pesos. By comparison, the average annual family income in 2009 would be valued at 179 thousand pesos, while the average annual family expenditure, at 153 thousand pesos.




Income gap between the richest decile and the poorest decile remains wide

- The gap in income between families in the richest decile and families in the poorest decile remains wide.
- Families in the richest decile, earned an annual income of 715 thousand pesos in 2012 or 60 thousand pesos monthly, on average. On the other hand, the families in the poorest decile, earned an average annual income of 69 thousand pesos or about 6 thousand pesos monthly.
- The income of the families in the richest decile is 10 times that of the poorest decile. This finding is true for both 2009 and 2012.




All regions exhibited an increase in average annual family income

- At the regional level, at 2012 prices, all regions exhibited an increase in family average annual income. Families in the National Capital Region (NCR) had the highest annual family income at 379 thousand pesos, on average. contrast, families in Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (ARMM) had the lowest annual family income at 130 thousand pesos, on average. (Table 3A).
- Adjusting for the inflation between 2009 and 2012, using 2006 prices, the average annual income for 2012 of NCR families would be valued at 305 thousand pesos and ARMM at 91 thousand pesos (Table 3B).
- At 2006 prices, eight regions showed a decline in average annual family income (Table 3B).




Income distribution remains wide in 2012

- At the national level, the Gini coefficient, which is a measure of income inequality, was estimated at 0.4605 for year 2012. In 2009, the ratio was 0.4641 which may indicate some improvement in the income distribution among families (Table 4 and Figure 4). A gini coefficient equal to 0 indicates perfect income equality among families, while a value of 1 indicates absolute income inequality
- Five regions registered a Gini coefficient higher than the national figure in 2012. These regions are Northern Mindanao (0.4844),Eastern Visayas (0.4834), Western Visayas (0.4754), Central Visayas (0.4712),and Cordillera **Administrative** (0.4675).Region ARMM had the lowest Gini coefficient at 0.2882.



Housing expenses remain second to food expenses

 In terms of the pattern of spending, for all families regardless of income, the expenditure on food accounted for 42.8 percent of the total family expenditure. This was followed by the expenditure on housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels which made up 20.7 percent of the total family expenditure (Table 5).



- Among families in the bottom 30.0 percent per capita income group, expenses on food accounted for a much higher percentage, that is, two-thirds (62.3%) of the total family expenditure, followed by expenditure on housing, water, electricity, gas and other fuels at 15.3 percent (Table 5 and Figure 5).
- In contrast, families in the upper 70.0 percent per capita income group spent 39.7 percent
 of their total expenditure on food and 21.5 percent on housing, water, electricity, gas and
 other fuels.
- Transport is the third important item of expenditure for both poor and non-poor families with the spending on it accounting for 4.8 percent of all expenditures by poor families and 7.9 percent by non-poor families.



APPENDICES

A. DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Respondent

The respondent interviewed in this survey is the household head or the person who manages the finances of the family, or any member of the family who can give reliable information or answers to the questionnaire.

Family

A family is defined as a group of persons usually living together comprising of the head and other persons related to him or her by blood, marriage or adoption. For purposes of this survey, the "extended" family concept is followed. Also, a single person living alone is considered as a separate family.

The following are the different types of households covered in the survey:

- 1. Single family also referred to as nuclear family, consists of a father and mother with unmarried children, or a parent with unmarried children. For purposes of the survey, a single person-household is also considered as a single family. Likewise, unmarried sisters and brothers who are living together are considered as one household. The presence of a boarder and domestic helper will not change the household type.
- 2. **Extended family** refers to a household composed of a nuclear family, as defined above, together with relatives like the son- or daughter-in-law; grandson or granddaughter; and parents or other relatives of the head or spouse.
- 3. **Two or more non-related members** refers to a household with two or more families or two or more persons not related to each other by blood, marriage or adoption.

Family Size

This refers to the total number of family members enumerated. Included as family members are those whose relationship to the household head is any of the following: spouse; son or daughter; father or mother; son- or daughter-in-law; sister or brother; granddaughter or grandson; or other relative.

Family Income

Total family income includes primary income and receipts from other sources received by all family members during the calendar year 2012, as participants in any economic activity or as recipients of transfers, pensions or grants. Primary income includes: salaries and wages, commissions, tips, bonuses, family and clothing allowances, transportation and representation allowances, honoraria, and other forms of compensation; and net receipts derived from the operation of family-operated enterprises or activities; and practice of a profession or trade.

Income from other sources include: imputed rental values of owner-occupied dwelling units, interests, rentals including landowner's share of agricultural products, pensions, support, and value of food and non-food items received as gifts by the family (as well as the

imputed value of services rendered free of charge to the family). Also included as part of family income are receipts from family sustenance activities which are not considered as family-operated enterprise.

Following the International Labour Organization (ILO)'s concept of income, the 2012 FIES excludes: profits from sale of stocks and bonds; backpay and proceeds from insurance; net winnings from gambling, sweepstakes and lotteries; and inheritance, as part of family income. However, these are included as part of other receipts.

Income Decile

Two levels of income deciles were utilized in this survey – national and regional. The national income decile is obtained by ranking the weighted total family income of all the sample families in the country, from lowest to highest. Then, these are compiled into ten groups. The first tenth, meaning those with the lowest income, is called the first decile; the second tenth, second decile; and so on.

A similar procedure is implemented for the regional decile, except that what is arrayed is the weighted total family income of sample families in a given region.

Main Source of Income

This refers to the source from which most of the income of the family is obtained. If the family has more than one source of income, the main source to be considered is the one where the bulk of income is derived.

Salaries and Wages from Employment

It includes all forms of compensation, whether in cash or in kind, received by family members who are regular or occasional/seasonal workers in agricultural and non-agricultural industries.

Net Share of Crops, Fruits and Vegetables Produced, Aquaculture Products Harvested or Livestock and Poultry Raised by Other Households

This refers to the share of harvested crops, fruits, vegetables, aquaculture products and others received by the household from tenants, or a fixed rent or any amount out of the produce received from tenants during the reference period. It also includes the share of the family from the proceeds of the sale of livestock which the family owned but raised by others, and disposed of during the reference period, although there was no landlord-tenant relationship between the sample family and the one who raised it.

Received as Gifts

The received as gifts include all food and non-food items received in kind by the family during the reference period. For food items, alcoholic beverages and tobacco received in kind, only those consumed by the family during the reference period are included. Foodstuff received in the form of support, assistance or relief is likewise considered as gifts. However, food items, alcoholic beverages and tobacco consumed by a family member at parties attended, or food items offered to him or her by friends are not included.

Food and non-food items received as gifts include those received from other households, charitable institutions, the government, or from persons abroad, free of charge.

Entrepreneurial Activity

An entrepreneurial activity or a family-operated activity is any economic activity, business or enterprise, whether in agriculture or in non-agriculture sector, engaged in by any member of the family as an operator or as self-employed.

The Included family-operated activities are those which are operated as single proprietorship or loose partnership, without formal organization. Thus, partnerships, corporations, associations, and the like which are formally organized and registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) are excluded.

Family Sustenance Activity

A family sustenance activity is also a family activity but unlike an entrepreneurial activity, the produce is mainly for home consumption. A family is considered engaged in a family sustenance activities if there was a disposal (consumed and/or a small proportion was sold, given away) during the reference period). Occasionally, sales are made when the harvest or produce is more than enough for family consumption.

Family Expenditures

Family expenditures refer to the expenses or disbursements made by the family purely for personal consumption during the calendar year 2012. Value consumed from net share of crops, fruits and vegetables produced, aquaculture products harvested or livestock raised by other households, family sustenance and entrepreneurial activities are considered as family expenditures. Gifts, support, assistance or relief in goods and services received by the family from friends, relatives, and others, are also included as part of family expenditures.

They exclude all expenses in relation to farm or business operations, investment ventures, purchase of real property, and other disbursements which do not involve personal consumption.

Food Consumed at Home

The items included in this portion cover the actual consumption (not expenditure) of the family during the past week. This category includes the food prepared at home and eaten in the place of work, in school, or in any place other than home.

Food consumption covers only the actual consumption of the family, as well as of domestic helpers and other persons employed by the family to do odd jobs around the house, and family guests. The guests may be relatives or non-relatives who are not members of the household, but had stayed with or visited the family for less than a week during the past week. The consumption of boarders and other persons in the same household not related to the family is excluded from this category.

Food Regularly Consumed Outside the Home

This includes food regularly bought and eaten by the family members outside the home like snacks, lunch and others and those cooked food bought outside the home but eaten at home. The daily allowance for snacks and meals at school of members of the household who are attending school is also covered in this category. No value given to food consumed by a family member at parties he attended or food items occasionally offered by friends.

Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels

This refers to the total family expenses for actual and imputed rentals of housing and consumption of water, electricity, gas and other fuels during the reference period. The rentals for housing normally include payment for the use of the land on which the property stands. Also included is the imputed rent of the dwelling unit occupies by the family-owner. The maintenance and repair of the dwelling include products and materials purchased for minor maintenance and repair. The total value of the service of both cost of labour and materials are covered.

For a family who shares facilities with other households or whose total consumption of water, electricity, gas and other fuels include both personal and business expenses, only an estimate of the family's personal consumption is reported. If the electricity and water are included in the rental paid for the house, an approximate amount for the electricity and water is deducted.

Imputed Rent of Owner-Occupied Dwelling Unit

Imputed rent is the estimated amount that the owner of a dwelling unit would charge if he or she were to rent his or her entire dwelling unit monthly, unfurnished and excluding the costs for utilities. The rental value is based on the prevailing rate in the locality. Imputed rent differs from amortization payments. Imputed rent refers to the value of the house/lot based on its utility, while amortization payments refer to the periodic payments made by the family on real property they acquired on installment basis. The imputed rent of free housing enjoyed by the employees is also included.

Furnishings, Household Equipment and Routine Household Maintenance

This includes the value of furniture and furnishing, carpets and other floor coverings, repair of furniture, household textiles and appliances, glassware, tableware and household utensils, tools and equipment for house and garden, and goods and services for routine household maintenance, for example dinnerware, silverware and kitchen utensils acquired within the reference period for family use, including those bought or received during special occasions. If these are made at home for family use, the total value of the materials and the cost of labor paid are reported as the value of the finished product. However, the value of labor rendered by a household member, free of charge, is not included.

All major household appliances such as refrigerator, washing machine, cooking range and air conditioner, house and garden tools acquired on a cash basis during the reference period are included.

The furnishing and household equipment purchased on installment basis during the reference period are also included. The reported total value of the furnishing and household equipment are the total amount of installments paid plus the initial down payment made on the items during the reference period.

Taxes

The following forms of taxes were included in the survey:

- 1. **Income Tax** refers to the tax levied on the income of a working person in pursuit of his or her occupation.
- 2. Real Estate Tax refers to the tax imposed on real property of the family (e.g. house and lot for family use) in proportion to its value. This includes real estate tax levied on real property of the family used for personal purposes. Therefore, taxes levied on private properties of the family used solely for business purposes are excluded.
- 3. Other Direct Taxes refer to taxes which are demanded from a taxpayer, who shoulders the burden of the tax; or tax which the taxpayer cannot shift to another. Specific examples are inheritance tax, alien certificate of registration (ACR) and donor's tax. Other taxes paid by the family such as custom's duties paid for personal effects bought from abroad, amusement tax and taxes paid as a consumer are also included.

Other Receipts

These are non-income receipts comprising of value at cost of real and personal property sold, loans from other households, business firms and government institutions, payments for loans granted to others and withdrawals from savings or business equity. Profits from sale of stocks and bonds; back pay and proceed from insurance; net winnings from gambling, sweepstakes and lotteries; and inheritance are also included as other receipts.

Other Disbursements

Other disbursements refer to non-family expenditures, which may give an indication of savings on the part of the family. These include: purchase or amortization of real property; payments of cash loan (principal); installments of appliances bought before 2012; installments for personal transport bought before 2012; loans granted to persons outside the household; amount deposited in banks or investments; and major repair or construction of a house.

Medians and Averages; Rounding of Estimates

Medians and averages are computed from unrounded figures. All absolute figures are independently rounded to the nearest thousand; hence, the group total may not always be equal to the sum of the individual figures.

Percentages are computed from unrounded absolute figures and may not always add up to exactly 100.0 percent because of rounding. The total percent, however, is always shown as 100.0.

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
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
