

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FOREWORD

This report presents the results of the 2013 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS). It is the ninth APIS since it was first conducted in 1998. The APIS is primarily meant to provide non-income poverty indicators that can be used for assessment of the Filipino family's living conditions.

Cognizant of the need to produce more timely poverty statistics urgently needed by users and stakeholders, the 2013 APIS, for the first time, used a more detailed set of questions on income, adopting the latest income module of Family Income and Expenditures Survey (FIES). As a result, the 2013 APIS provided the necessary data inputs for the generation of national-level estimates of official poverty statistics of the country.

Highlights of the 2013 report include national estimates of selected non-income poverty indicators, profiles of families who belong to the lowest 30 percent income stratum and highest 70 percent income stratum, among others.

The results from the 2013 APIS provides critical information that can be used by policy makers and program implementers in their planning, assessment and evaluation of the various programs designed to reduce poverty in the country. It can also be used by researchers interested in analyzing the poverty situation in the country using non-income indicators.

The Philippines Statistics Authority (PSA) wishes to extend its sincerest gratitude to everyone who contributed to the successful conduct of this survey. More particularly, we wish to extend our highest appreciation to the respondents who generously shared their time and information to enable us to gather the needed data for poverty alleviation; and to the various employees who untiringly carried out the various activities of the survey in all its stages.

Background

The 2013 Annual Poverty Indicators Survey (APIS) was conducted by the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA) in July 2013. It is the ninth APIS since it was first conducted in 1998. Since 1998, APIS has been conducted during the years when the Family Income and Expenditure Survey (FIES) is not conducted, except in 2001 and 2005 due to budgetary constraints. The APIS is primarily meant to provide non-income poverty indicators that can be used for assessment of the Filipino family's living conditions. Cognizant of the need to produce more timely poverty statistics urgently needed by users and stakeholders, the 2013 APIS, for the first time, used a more detailed set of questions on income, adopting the latest income module of Family Income and Expenditures Survey (FIES). As a result, the 2013 APIS provided the necessary data inputs for the generation of national-level estimates of official poverty statistics of the country.

Objectives of the Survey

The APIS is a nationwide survey primarily designed to provide non-income indicators related to poverty at the national level. It aimed to gather data on the socio-economic profile of families and other information related to their living condition.

For 2013, the APIS provided data on family income to serve as inputs in the computation of first semester poverty incidence and poverty threshold at the national level. Further, it also determined the family expenditure pattern of families in the first semester of 2013.

Specifically, it generates indicators that are correlated with poverty in order to determine the percent distribution of families in relation to the following indicators:

- 1. ownership or possession like of house and lot and the types of the materials of the roofs and walls of their housing units;
- 2. access to safe water and sanitation and type of toilet facility they use in their homes;
- 3. children 6-11 years old enrolled in elementary;
- 4. children 12-15 years old enrolled in high school;
- 5. with members 18 years old and over who are gainfully employed and with working children 5-17 years old;
- 6. who received social protection and the total amount received for the period January-June 2013; and
- 7. access to government services.

Sampling Design

The 2013 APIS is a sample survey designed to provide data representative of the country. The 2013 APIS used the 2003 master sample created for household surveys on the

basis of the 2000 Census of Population and Housing (CPH) results. The survey used one replicate of the master sample. For each region (domain) and stratum, a three-stage sampling scheme was used: the selection of primary sampling units (PSUs) for the first stage, of sample enumeration areas (EAs) for the second stage, and of sample housing units for the third stage. PSUs within a region were stratified based on the proportion of households living in housing units made of strong materials, proportion of households in the barangay engaged in agricultural activities and per capita income of the city/municipality.

In the first stage, PSUs were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 CPH. PSUs consisted of a barangay or a group of contiguous barangays. In the second stage, in each sampled PSU, EAs were selected with probability proportional to the number of households in the 2000 CPH. An EA is defined as an area with discernable boundaries consisting of approximately 350 contiguous households. In the third stage, from each sampled EA, housing units were selected using systematic sampling. For operational considerations, at most 30 housing units were selected per sample EA. All households in sample housing units were interviewed except for sample housing units with more than three households. In such a housing unit, three households were randomly selected with equal probability.

Only household members related to the household head by blood, marriage or adoption were considered as members of the sample household in APIS. Family members of the household head who are working abroad were excluded.

The results presented in this report are weighted to ensure that the data are representative of the population of the country. Sampling weights, or expansion factors, were applied to the data obtained from sample households in order to derive estimates for the larger population from which the sample households were selected for the purpose of survey interviewing. The weights or expansion factors applied to each sample household reflected the probability of the households being selected for the survey sample. More specifically, the basic sampling weights assigned were equal to the inverse of the joint probability of selection in the three stages of sample selection. Since the sample was self-weighting within regions (domains) or strata, each household in a particular stratum received the same weight, or raising factor.

The weights adjustment factor takes into account the sample EAs which were not enumerated and households which were not interviewed. The product of the basic weights and weights adjustment factor was used to obtain the preliminary weighted estimates of the total number of families.

In order to make the weighted estimate of the total number of persons by age group and sex consistent with the estimated number of persons by age group and sex as of July 2013, a final weight adjustment factor was used. The estimated number of persons by age group and sex, by region as of July 2013 was derived using the 2010 Census-based population projection. In each region, the final weight adjustment is equal to the ratio of the estimated number of persons by age group and sex as of July 2013 to the preliminary weighted estimate of the total number of persons by age group and sex from the 2013 APIS data.

Response Rate

Of the 11,334 eligible sample households for the 2013 APIS, 10,864 were successfully interviewed. This translated to a response rate of 96 percent at the national level. The response rate is the ratio of the total household who were completely interviewed to the total number of eligible households. Eligible households include households who were completely interviewed, refused to be interviewed, temporarily away, not at home or on vacation, and those located in critical or flooded areas during the survey period.

Limitations of the Data

Data gathered from APIS are results of a sample survey and are therefore subject to sampling variations, that is, sampling errors are expected since the data are not obtained through complete enumeration or census.

The survey covered a national sample of households deemed sufficient to provide estimates about the population at the national levels only. Hence, tabulations and cross-tabulations of variables at lower geographic levels are not generated since these may not be statistically reliable.

Survey estimates may also be affected by non-sampling errors such as deliberate under or over reporting of income and expenditures or reluctance on the part of the respondents to reveal their true levels of incomes/expenditures.

Moreover, considering that both cash and non-cash expenditures and income are gathered in APIS, valuation of non-cash income and expenditures may pose some problems. The instructions are to use market prices prevailing in the locality for goods and services received as gifts, and farm gate prices for goods consumed from own production. However, market prices may not be available for all items in the locality or market prices/farm gate prices may be highly variable for different localities.

Furthermore, data users attempting to match 2013 APIS and the 2012 FIES should take note of the differences in the reference period. The 2012 FIES was conducted in two visits covering the periods January to June 2012 and July to December 2012 while 2013 APIS covered January to June 2013 only.

Survey Questionnaire

APIS Form 1 is the survey questionnaire that contains questions on the following topics:

• Geographic Identification and Other Family Information - region, province, municipality, barangay, address, design codes, result of visit and code, names of household head and respondent and the certification portion.

- **Demographic Characteristics** obtains information of all family members such as name of family head, relationship to the head, sex, age and marital status.
- **Health Status** obtains information on whether illnesses and/or injuries experienced by the family are work related or not.
- Schooling Status and Highest Grade Completed determines whether a family member aged 3 to 24 years is currently attending formal school, and if so, the grade or year the member is currently attending. If not attending, then the reason for not attending school is asked. It determines if the family members aged 3-5 years are attending/have attended early education/learning system in order to assess their 'school readiness'. It also determines the educational attainment of the family members aged 5 years or over.
- Higher Education Institution obtains information of family members on the higher educational institution (HEI) where he/she earned his/her college degree and what year did he/she graduated.
- Economic Characteristics obtains information on the job or business of each family member aged 5 years or over have during the past six months. It also includes questions on occupation and business the family member engaged in.
- Housing, Water and Sanitation obtains information that relates to housing characteristics and household conveniences/amenities owned by the family. The main source of water supply and kind of toilet facility used were also asked.
- Other Relevant Information obtains information on whether or not the family makes use of any form of credit in financing the family's needs. It also determines if the family has been a beneficiary of the KALAHI-CIDSS and Child Benefit (Child Protection) Program. It also obtains information if a family member experienced hunger because he/she did not have food to eat.
- Social Protection obtains information about programs that seek to reduce poverty
 and vulnerability to risks and enhance the social status and rights of the
 marginalized by promoting and protecting their livelihood and employment,
 protecting them against hazards and sudden interruptions/loss of income, and
 improving their capacity to manage risks.
- Access to Government Services obtains information to further enhance the
 established empirical baseline on the state and extent or pervasiveness of
 corruption in the country.
- Family Expenditures obtains information on the expenses made by the family purely from family members' personal consumption.

- Salaries and Wages from Employment obtains information on the income of each family members aged 10 years or over whether in cash or in kind. It includes basic salaries and wages, allowances, honoraria, housing, clothing, food and other income derived from employment.
- Net Share of Crops, Fruits and Vegetables Produced, Aquaculture Products
 Harvested or Livestock and Poultry Raised by Other Households obtains
 information on the net share from crops, fruits and vegetables produced,
 aquaculture products harvested or livestock and poultry raised by other family even
 without a land-lord tenant relationship.
- Family Sustenance Activities (FSA) obtains information on the goods produced mainly for home consumption only. If there was a disposal (consumed and/or a small proportion was sold, given away, etc.) during the reference period, it is considered engaged in FSA.
- Other Sources of Income obtains information on other sources of income not derived from work.
- Entrepreneurial Activities determines if any member of the family is engaged as operator or self-employed in any agricultural or non-agricultural family-operated activities. If engaged, this section asks for the total net income, value consumed and value given away as gifts of the products derived/produced from such activity.

Concepts and Definitions

<u>Bottom 30%</u> – In descending order of the family per capita income, the bottom 30 percent refers to the bottom 30 percent of the total families in the income distribution. This grouping of families was used as a proxy for those falling below the poverty line.

<u>Top 70%</u> – In descending order of the family per capita income, the upper 70 percent refers to the upper 70 percent of the total families in the income distribution. It is the complement of the bottom 30 percent.

<u>Respondent</u> – An adult knowledgeable member of the sample family who can provide accurate answers to all or most of the questions in the survey.

<u>Family</u> – Aggregate of persons bound by ties of kinship, who live together under the same roof and eat together or share in common the family food. For the purpose of this survey, a household can be classified as a nuclear family, extended family or a single person family. For a household comprising of members who are not related with each other by blood, marriage or adoption, only the head of the household is considered. This case is a single person family.

<u>Family head</u> - An adult member of the family who is responsible for the care and organization of the family or who is regarded as such by the members of the family.

<u>Highest educational attainment</u> - The highest grade or year completed in school, college or university.

<u>Work</u> - Any activity of a person done for pay, profit or without pay on family farm or enterprise, or an activity done by a farm operator or member of his/her family on another's farm on "exchange labor" arrangement. In addition, any activity that a person does during the reference period in relation to minor activities such as home gardening, raising of crops/fruits, raising hogs/poultry, and fishing for home consumption, and manufacturing for home use are also considered as work.

<u>Floor area</u> - The area enclosed by the exterior walls of the housing unit. In case of several floors, the area of the housing unit is the sum of areas of all floors.

<u>Family expenditures</u> – Refer to the expenses or disbursement made by the family purely for personal consumption from January to June 2013. Value consumed from net share of crops, fruits and vegetables produced, aquaculture products harvested or livestock raised by other households, family sustenance and entrepreneurial activities are considered as family expenditures. Gifts, support, assistance or relief in goods and services received by the family from friends, relatives, and others, are also included as part of family expenditure.

They exclude all expenses in relation to farm or business operations, investment ventures, purchase of real property, and other disbursements which do not involve personal consumption.

<u>Family income</u> - Total family income includes primary income and receipts from other sources received by all family members from January to June 2013, as participants in any economic activity or as recipients of transfers, pensions or grants. Primary income includes: salaries and wages, commissions, tips, bonuses, family and clothing allowances, transportation and representation allowances, honoraria, and other forms of compensation; and net receipts derived from the operation of family-operated enterprises or activities, and practice of a profession or trade.

Income from other sources include: imputed rental values of owner-occupied dwelling units, interest, rentals including landowner's share of agricultural products, pensions, support, and value of food and non-food items received as gifts by the family (as well as the imputed value of services rendered free of charge to the family). Also included as part of family income are receipts from family sustenance activities which are not considered as family-operated enterprise.

<u>Proportion of families with access to safe water supply</u> – The ratio of the number of families who access water from community water system (piped into their dwelling, yard/plot or public tap) and protected wells to the total number of families.

<u>Proportion of families with sanitary toilet</u> – The ratio of the number of families with flush toilet (either owned or shared) and close pit to the total number of families.

<u>Proportion of families with owned or owner-like possession of housing units</u> – The ratio of the number of families with housing unit owned or amortized to the total number of families.

<u>Proportion of families with houses made of strong materials</u> – The ratio of the number of families with houses having roofs and outer walls made of strong materials such as galvanized iron/aluminum, tile, concrete, bricks stone and asbestos to the total number of families.

<u>Proportion of families with gainfully employed family head</u> – The ratio of the number of families with a family head who is gainfully employed to the total number of families.

<u>Proportion of families with gainfully employed members aged 18 years or over</u> – The ratio of the number of families with gainfully employed members aged 18 years or over to the total number of families with members aged 18 years or over.

<u>Proportion of families with children aged 6-11 years in elementary</u> – The ratio of the number of families with children aged 6-11 years attending elementary school to the total number of families with children aged 6-11 years.

<u>Proportion of families with children aged 12-15 years in high school</u> – The ratio of the number of families with children aged 12-15 years attending high school to the total number of families with children aged 12-15 years.

<u>Proportion of families with members aged 5-17 years who are working</u> – The ratio of the number of families with children aged 5-17 years who are working to the total number of families with children aged 5-17 years.


HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2013 APIS RESULTS

In this report, families were classified into two income strata according to their per capita income. Families are grouped into two: those families whose income belonging to the bottom 30% and the remaining top 70% of the total families. Findings from the survey are presented according to these two groups income strata.

A. FAMILY SIZE AND CHARACTERISTICS OF FAMILY HEADS

A.1 Average Family Size


Information on the family size and characteristics of family heads may indicate the economic status of a family. As of July 2013, there was an estimated 21.9 million families in the country. The average family size in the same period was 4.5 persons (Figure 1). surprisingly, average family size of families belonging to the bottom 30% were larger (5.6) as compared with the top 70% (4.0).

A.2 Age and Sex of Family Heads

Around eight in ten families (77.1 %) was headed by males. The survey also showed that female family heads were generally older than their male counterparts. About 55.3 percent of the female family heads were aged 55 years or over compared to 32.4 percent among the male

heads (Table 1). A family head is an adult member who is responsible for the care and organization of the family or generally who is regarded as such by the family members.

70% Heads among the top families were generally older than the heads of the bottom 30% families. Four in ten heads (40 %) of the top 70% families were aged 55 years or over compared to 32 percent among the heads of the bottom 30% families.



A.3 Educational Attainment of Family Heads

Three in four of the family heads (75.6 %) did not reach college. More specifically, 37.3 percent had reached or completed elementary education, while 36 percent had reached or finished high school and two percent were no grade completed/nursery/kinder/preparatory.

Those who were college undergraduates comprised nine percent while academic degree holders accounted to 11.9 percent (Table 1).

The survey also showed a higher proportion of female heads who finished college or higher level of education compared to their male counterpart. About 16.4 percent of the total female heads finished college or higher level of education while 10.5 percent of the total male heads attained that level of education.





A.4 Gainful Employment of Family Heads

In 2013, four out of five (81.2 %) family heads were gainfully employed (Table 1) or had a job or business at anytime from January 1 to June 30, 2013.

The proportion with gainful employment among family heads of bottom 30% families was higher (89.0 %) compared to compared to the top 70% (77.8 %).

Male heads who were gainfully employed comprised 87.8 percent of the total male heads. The corresponding proportion among female heads is lower at 58.7 percent.

B. HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS

B.1 Tenure Status of Housing Unit and Lot


The data on family's housing characteristics can indicate the health and economic well being of families. In the 2013 APIS, the tenure status of housing unit and lot was asked.

In 2013, 62.1 percent of the families own the house and lot they occupied (Table 2). The remaining 37.9 percent occupied houses and lots under the following tenure: own house, rentfree lot with consent of owner (16.6 %), rent house/room including lot (8.6 %), rent-free house and lot with consent of owner (7.3 %), own house, rent-free lot without consent of owner (3.0 %), own house, rent lot (2.1 %), or rent-free house and lot without consent of owner (less than one percent). Among the bottom 30% families, 53.5 percent owned their house and lot, while among the top 70% families, the proportion is higher at 65.8 percent.

B.2 Floor Area of Housing Unit

Two-thirds of families (63.6 %) were residing in housing units with a floor area of less than 50 square meters (sq. m.). Families residing in housing units with a floor area of less than 10 sq. m. comprised less than 1 percent, families living in housing units with a floor area ranging from 10 to 29 sq. m., 32.7 percent, and those with 30 to 49 sq. m., 30 percent (Table 3).




Among the bottom 30% families, majority (52.1 %) occupied housing units with a floor area of 10 to 29 sq. m. One out of three (28.8 %) bottom 30% families was living in a housing unit with a floor area of 30 to 49 sq. m. Top 70% families were living in housing units with a larger floor area. Forty-five percent of the top 70% families were living in housing units with a floor area of at least 50 sq. m. compared to 17 percent of bottom 30% families.

B.3 Type of Building/House

Ninety-two percent of Filipino families were residing in single houses (Table 4). The rest dwelt in apartments, accessoria, condominiums or townhouses (4.7 %), duplex houses (3.0 %), or commercial, industrial, agricultural buildings or houses (less than one percent).

B.4 Construction Materials of the Roof and Outer Walls

The majority of Filipino houses had roofs and outer walls made of strong materials. About 81.4 percent of families had houses with strong roofs and 68.8 percent had strong outer walls (Tables 5 and 6). Strong materials for roof and outer walls refer to galvanized iron or aluminum, tile, concrete, brick stone, while light materials refer to cogon, nipa or anahaw.

As expected, a larger proportion of top 70% families had housing units made of strong roofs (88.8 %) and outer walls (79.9 %) compared to the bottom 30% families (64.1 % and 42.8 %, respectively). One in four bottom 30% families was living in a house with roof made of light materials (24.0 %), and three in 10 families (34.2 %) were living in houses with outer walls made of light materials.



B.5 Electricity


Not all families have electricity in their homes. Nine out of 10 (89.4 %) families in the country have electricity in their homes (Table 7). Seventy-five percent among the bottom 30% families had electricity in their homes.

B.6 Main Source of Water Supply

The data on main source of water supply provide information on the proportion of families with access to safe water supply. Considered as clean and safe sources of water supply are community water system, which may be piped into dwellings or into yards, or piped into public taps, and protected well.

Eighty-four percent of the total families had access to a safe source of water supply (Table 7). The remaining 16 percent of families obtained their water from sources considered unsafe, such as unprotected well (5.1 %), developed spring (4.3 %), undeveloped spring (2.1 %), tanker truck or peddler or neighbor (3.9 %). River, stream, pond, lake or dam and rainwater registered less than one percent.

Seven out of ten families in bottom 30% had access to safe water compared to nine in ten families in the top 70%.


B.7 Toilet Facility

Data about the toilet facility used by the family provide indicators of health and sanitation status of families. One of its indicators is the proportion of families who use a sanitary toilet. For this survey, sanitary toilet refers to flush toilet (either owned or shared) and

close pit type of toilet facility.

At the national level, the proportion of Filipino families with sanitary toilets was 92.2 percent (Table 8). Other families used open pit (2.4 %); both drop or overhang and pail system posted less than one percent these are considered unsanitary toilets.

In the Philippines, there were 4.6 percent or about 1 million families with no toilet facilities in their homes.



B.8 Household Conveniences

Data on ownership of family conveniences provides proxy indicators of the economic status of the family. Top 70% families tend to own household conveniences than the bottom 30% families.

Cellular phone was the most common household appliance in Filipino homes, followed by television. Four out of five families (80.2 %) owned cellular phone while 74.2 percent had a television (Table 9). Among top 70% families, those with cellular phone made up 86.6 percent, while among bottom 30% families, 65.2 percent.



C. EDUCATION

C.1 Highest Grade Completed of Population 5 Years or Over

Inadequate education is associated with poverty. Members of top 70% families tend to be more highly educated than members of the bottom 30% families. Persons who had attained a college level or a higher level of education comprised 28 percent among top 70% families compared to 5.2 percent among bottom 30% families. Those who were high school graduates in top 70% families comprised 23.1 percent, while in bottom 30% families, 15.7 percent (Table 10).

C.2 Attendance in School of Persons aged 3 to 24 Years

In the survey, the attendance in school by family members aged 3 to 24 years was asked. The cut-off age for school attendance is 3 years to measure attendance of children in early childhood learning schools like nursery, kindergarten and preparatory schools. In this survey, a person who was enrolled in the school year covering June 2012 to March 2013 is considered as attending school.

In 2013, of the estimated 44.5 million population aged 3 to 24 years, two-thirds (66.6 %) were enrolled or attending school during school year 2012-2013 (Table 11). School attendance among the members aged 3 to 24 years of the bottom 30% families was higher than the top 70% families with (67.5 % and 65.8 %, respectively). By sex, of the total females of this specified age group, 67.8 percent attended school during the said school year, while among the males, 65.3 percent.

Of the total number of persons aged 3 to 24 years who were attending school, 28.5 percent were children aged 6 to 9 years. Those in age group 10 to 12 years comprised 20.3 percent, and those aged 13 to 16 years, 24.5 percent.

Persons of school age in the top 70% population were more likely to pursue higher education compared to those in the bottom 30% population. While 20.8 percent of the school age population in the top 70% population were attending college or post graduate schools, the corresponding proportion in the bottom 30% population is 4.7 percent (Table 12). However, proportion of attending elementary education was higher among the persons of school age in the bottom 30% population compared to top 70% population with (57.6 % and 42.4 %, respectively).

There were approximately 12 million persons aged 6 to 24 years who were not attending school during the school year 2012-2013 (June 2012 to March/April 2013) (Table 13).

Nationwide, the most common reasons for not attending school were employment or looking for work (27.5 % of those not attending school), lack of personal interest (15.5 %), and family income not sufficient to send child to school (13.5 %). These were also the most common reasons reported by those who were not attending school in the bottom 30% population: lack of personal interest (20.6 %), family income not sufficient to send child to school (19.7 %), and employment or looking for work (19.5 %). While among the top 70% population, reasons were employment or looking for work (32.5 %), finished schooling (18.7 %), and marriage or taking care of children (12.6 %).

Among the males aged 6 to 24 years, employment/looking for work (31.8 %), lack of personal interest (22.8 %), and family income not sufficient to send child to school (14.7 %) were the top reasons why they were not attending school. A slightly different pattern was observed among females aged 6 to 24 years were employment or looking for work (22.6 %), marriage or taking care of children (22.4 %), and finished schooling (15.8 %) were the reasons why they were not attending school.

C.4 Children in Elementary Grade

A total of 8.8 million families with children aged 6 to 11 years was recorded in the survey. Of this number, 8.5 million or 97.7 percent had children who were enrolled in elementary grades (Table 14). The proportion of families with children aged 6 to 11 years who were enrolled in elementary was almost similar for both bottom 30% families (97.5 %) and top 70% families (97.7 %).

C.5 Children in High School

Of the 7.3 million families with children aged 12 to 15 years, 75.2 percent or 5.5 million families were reported having children in this age bracket who were in high school (Table 15). Among top 70% families with children aged 12 to 15 years, 80.4 percent were with children of this age group who were enrolled in high school, while it was 68.1 percent among bottom 30% families.

D. ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

D.1 Families with Working Members aged 18 Years or Over

In the 2013 APIS, a family member was considered employed if he or she had worked or had a job or business at anytime during the reference semester, that is, between January 1 to June 30, 2013. A work is defined as any economic activity that a person does for pay, profit or without pay on family farm or enterprise, or an activity done by a farm operator or member of his/her family on another's farm on "exchange labor" arrangement.

Of the total 21.9 million families with at least one member aged 18 years or over, about 92.9 percent or 20.3 million were gainfully employed during the reference period (Table 16). Percentage of families with members aged 18 years or over who were gainfully employed was higher in the bottom 30% families (97.0 %) compared to top 70% families (91.2 %).

D.2 Families with Working Children aged 5-17 Years

The Labor Code of the Philippines specifies that no child below 18 years old shall be employed except when he/she works directly under the sole responsibility of his parents/guardian and his/her employment does not in any way interfere with his/her schooling. Although the survey results would not show whether the conditions stated above are met, the results would show the proportion or number of families with children aged below 18 years who are working.


Of the 13.8 million families with members aged 5 to 17 years, 12.6 percent or 1.7 million families were reported to have working children (Table 17). Among the bottom 30% families with members aged 5 to 17 years, 19.2 percent had working children while for the top 70% families, 8.5 percent had working children.

D.3 Families Engaged in Any Economic Activity

There are three major economic activities that contribute to a family's income. These are wages and salary, family sustenance activities, and entrepreneurial activities. Other sources of income include net share of crops, cash receipts both from abroad and domestic source, rentals from non-agricultural lands, interest, pension and retirement, workmen's compensation, social security benefits and dividends from investment.

In 2013, the number of families with at least one member reported to have engaged in any type of economic activity in the six months preceding the survey was estimated at 20.9 million (Table 18). Wage and salary workers accounted for 75.7 percent of such families; those engaged in entrepreneurial activity, 54.3 percent; and those engaged in family sustenance activity, 55.2 percent. For this report, more than one economic activity can be reported for one family.

Among the bottom 30% families engaged in an economic activity in the six months prior to the survey, 81.9 percent were involved in family sustenance and 61.3 percent in entrepreneurial activities. Families with wage and salary earning members comprised 73.7 percent. On the other hand, among the top 70% families, the largest proportion of families with members engaged in an economic activity were those with members who were salary and wage earners (76.6 %).

D.4 Employed Persons Aged 5 Years or Over by Class of Worker

Among employed persons in 2013 which numbered around 43.4 million, the largest proportion (62.9 %) were wage and salary workers, followed by self-employed without any employee at 23.7 percent (Table 19). Wage and salary workers include those who worked for private households, private establishments and government offices and those who worked with

pay in own family-operated farm or business. Unpaid family workers comprised of 10 percent of total employed persons. Employer in own family-operated farm or business had the least percentage at 3.4 percent.

The largest proportion of bottom 30% population and top 70% population were wage and salary workers with corresponding percentages of 55.2 percent and 66.8 percent.

E. FAMILY'S HEALTH

E.1 Illness/Injury Work-Related

There were approximately 27.9 million persons aged 5 years or over or 32.1 percent who got ill or injured six months prior to the conduct of the survey in 2013 (Table 20). Of this number, 16.9 percent had work-related illness/injury.


F. FAMILY INCOME AND EXPENDITURE

F.1 Total Family Income

In the 2013 APIS, family income includes, salaries and wages from jobs or businesses, incomes derived from entrepreneurial activities, net share of crops, fruits and vegetables produced, aquaculture products harvested or livestock and poultry raised by other households and from other sources such cash receipts, gifts, support, relief and other forms of assistance from abroad and from domestic source, rentals received from non-agricultural lands, buildings, space and other properties, interest, pension and retirement, workmen's compensation and social security benefits, and dividends from investment.

The total family income for the period January to June 2013 reached almost Php 2.6 trillion (Table 21). Almost 88.5 percent of this income or Php 2.3 trillion was earned by the top 70% families.

The largest percentage (46.3 %) of total family income was from salaries and wages. Income from entrepreneurial activities accounted for 19.7 percent of the total family income. A considerable percentage (32.4 %) of the total family income was derived from other sources.

Almost three-fourths of the Php 296 billion earned by bottom 30% families were contributed by wage and salary workers (44.6 %), those with entrepreneurial activities (26.5 %), and those with family sustenance activities (4.8 %). Forty-six percent of the total income of the top 70% families came from salaries and wages while 18.8 percent was from entrepreneurial activities and 33.5 percent from other sources.

The average family income for the six months prior to the survey, computed by dividing the total income for the period by the total number of families, amounted to Php 117,104 (Table 23). The average family income for the bottom 30% families was Php 45,053 while Php 147,989 for the top 70% families.

F.2 Family Expenditure and Saving

Family expenditures refers to the expenses or disbursements made by the family purely for personal consumption. It includes expenditures for food, housing, electricity, water, and other fuels, transportation, household and personal care, clothing and footwear, education, recreation, medicines, and others.

Total family expenditure from January 1 to June 30, 2013 amounted to Php 2.1 trillion (Table 22). Two-thirds (66.1 %) of the total expenditure were accounted on food (42.3%), housing, water, electricity, and other fuels (19.4 %), and education (4.4 %).

Eighty-six percent of the total family expenditure contributed by top 70% families while 14 percent by the bottom 30% families. Food was the higher proportion of expenditure among the bottom 30% families with 62.3 percent of the total expenditure of the bottom 30% families, this is, almost twice of the proportion of expenditure on food of the top 70% families (39. 1%).




FIGURE 14. Expenditure Pattern by Major Expenditure Group by Income Stratum

The total family savings or the total income minus the expenditure, for the same period was estimated at Php 425 billion. Top 70% families had a saving of Php 430 billion. Meanwhile, bottom 30% families disbursed Php 5.8 billion spending more than what they have earned. The average family expenditure was Php 97,685, Php 45,935 for the bottom 30% families and Php 119,868 for the top 70% families (Table 23).

F.3 Average Per Capita Income and Average Per Capita Expenditure

Average per capita income is computed by dividing the total income for the reference period by the total population. Likewise, average per capita expenditure is the total expenditure divided by total population.

The average per capita income nationally for the period January 1 to June 30, 2013 was approximately Php 26,100 (Table 23). The average per capita income for the bottom 30% families was Php 8,000 while Php 37,000 for the top 70% families. On the other hand, the average per capita expenditure at the national level was Php 21,800 while Php 8,200 for bottom 30% families and Php 30,000 for top 70% families.

Food threshold is the minimum income required to meet basic food needs and satisfy the nutritional requirements set by the Food and Nutrition Research Institute (FNRI) to ensure that one remains economically and socially productive. It is used to measure extreme or subsistence poverty. Poverty threshold is a similar concept, expanded to include basic non-food needs such as clothing, housing, transportation, health, and education expenses.

The Philippine Statistics Authority estimated that during the first semester of 2013, a family of five needed at least PhP 5,590 on the average every month to meet the family's basic food needs and at least PhP 8,022 on the average every month to meet both basic food and non-food needs. These amounts represent the monthly food threshold and monthly poverty threshold, respectively. The subsistence incidence among Filipino families or the proportion of Filipino families in extreme poverty was 7.7 percent during the first semester of 2013. The poverty incidence or the proportion of Filipino families below the poverty threshold was estimated at 19.1 percent during the same period.

G. OTHER RELEVANT INFORMATION

G.1 Acquisition of House and/or Lot thru the Assistance of Government Housing or Financing Program

Only 2.6 percent of total families or 572 thousand families had members who acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program (Table 26). Twenty-nine percent of families which acquired a house and/or lot thru the assistance of government housing or financing program had acquired the house or lot in 1992-1998, 27.9 percent within the period 1991 or earlier, 20.2 percent in 2001-2009, and 10.4 percent in 1999-2000 (Table 27).

G.2 Acquisition of Agricultural Land Under the CARP Land-Distribution Program

About 17.5 percent of total families or 3.8 million families owned a land used for agricultural purposes (Table 28). Of this number, 8 percent had acquired their agricultural lands under the Comprehensive Agrarian Reform Program (CARP) land-distribution program.

About 22.1 percent of bottom 30% families owned a land used for agricultural purposes compared to 15.6 percent of top 70% families. Seven percent of the bottom 30% families who owned lands used for agricultural purposes had acquired their lands under the CARP. The corresponding percentage among top 70% families is 8.6 percent.

G.3 Hunger

At the national level, families who experienced hunger in the three months prior to the survey made up 3.7 percent of all families in the country (Table 29). Of those families who experienced hunger, about 23.9 percent experienced it at least once in each week during the reference period, 38.5 percent experienced it at least once in each month, and 37.6 percent experienced it at least once in three months.

About 7.9 percent of the bottom 30% families in the entire country experienced hunger. Among the top 70% families, 1.9 percent experienced it.

G.4 Availment of Loan

Of the total families, 27.8 percent or 6.1 million families had members who availed loans in the six months prior to the survey in any lending institution or private individual whose business is lending money with interest (Table 30). The most common source of loan of families had members who availed loans were from relative/friend (49.3 %), microfinance institution (22.6 %), and informal lender (13.1 %) (Table 31).
