I. Background

The CBD is an international agreement whose main objectives are the: (1) conservation of biological diversity; (2) sustainable use of its components; and, (3) fair and equitable sharing of benefits derived from the utilization of genetic resources, including appropriate access to genetic resources and appropriate transfer of relevant technologies, taking into account all rights over resources and technologies, and appropriate funding (*Article 1, CBD Text*).

The CBD was opened for signature at the historical Earth Summit or the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED) in Rio de Janeiro in 1992. The Philippines signed on 12 June 1992 and ratified on 08 October 1993.

The CBD is legally binding on the Parties, in other words they have to implement the Convention, but it does not take the place of national laws. Rather it provides a framework to be respected by each Party, which has to adopt its own domestic legislation to ensure that the CBD is implemented at the national level

II. Structure

Conference of the Parties (CoP)

The CoP serves as the governing body of the Convention, and advances implementation of the Convention through the decisions it takes at its periodic meetings. Other functions of the CoP include the adoption of protocols or annexes, guidance to the financial mechanism or the Global Environmental Facility (GEF), and adoption of the budget.


Meetings of the CoP cover a broad agenda and reflect the program of work which the CoP has adopted. In CoP 1, Parties decided on a medium-term program of work for the period 1995-1997 which laid the foundation for the development of thematic work programs and cross-cutting issues. In addition, the CoP has decided on an ecosystem approach as the primary framework of action to be taken under the Convention. The CoP also recognizes the importance of cooperation and coordination between the CBD and other conventions and institutions.

The CoP meets every two years, a change from the annual meetings held from 1994 to 1996.

Subsidiary Bodies

Subsidiary Body of Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice (SBSTTA)

SBSTTA is an open-ended intergovernmental scientific and multidisciplinary advisory body of



the CoP which reports regularly to the CoP on all aspects of its work. It provides the CoP with advice and recommendations on the scientific, technical and technological aspects relating to the implementation of the Convention. SBSTTA recommendations are adopted by the CoP either in full or in modified form. Once adopted, these become decisions of the CoP.

Ad Hoc Open -ended Working Group on Access and Benefit -Sharing

The Working Group on Access and Benefit-Sharing was established pursuant to decision V/26 A of the CoP. It is composed of representatives, including experts, nominated by governments and regional economic integration organizations, and is open to the participation by indigenous and local communities, NGOs, industry and scientific and academic institutions, as well as intergovernmental organizations.

Its tasks are: (1) to develop guidelines and other approaches for submission to the CoP; and, (2) to assist Parties and stakeholders in addressing issues and concerns relevant to access to genetic resources and benefit-sharing.

Ad Hoc Open -ended Inter -sessional Working Group on Article 8(j) and Related Provisions

The Working Group on Article 8(j) was established pursuant to Decision IV/9 of the CoP to address the implementation of Article 8(j) and related provisions of the Convention. Among its tasks are to provide advice to the CoP on matters relating to the implementation of Article 8(j) and its related provisions, in particular to the development and implementation of a work program at national and international levels. Subsequently, Decision V/16 of the CoP expanded its mandate to include a review of the progress in the implementation of the priority tasks of its work program and to report it to the CoP. The working group is open to all Parties, including representatives from indigenous and local communities who embody traditional lifestyles relevant to the conservation and sustainable use of biological diversity.

Ad Hoc Open -ended Working Group o n Protected Areas

The Working Group on Protected Areas was established by decision VII/28 of the CoP to support and review the implementation of the program of work on protected areas which was also adopted during the same meeting of the CoP.

Working G roup on Review of Implementation of the Convention (WGRI)

The Working Group on Review of Implementation of the Convention was created pursuant to Decision VII/30 (23) of the CoP in recognition of the need for a more effective process of evaluating, reporting and reviewing implementation of the Convention and the Strategic Plan which the CoP adopted in 2002. The CoP committed to achieve by 2010, a significant reduction in the current rate of biodiversity loss.

Its main task is to address implementation-related issues, such as: progress in the implementation of the Strategic Plan; impacts and effectiveness of Convention processes; cooperation and stakeholder participation; monitoring, reporting and evaluation processes; and means of identifying and overcoming obstacles to effective implementation of the Convention.

Global Taxonomic Initiative (GTI)

The GTI was established by the CoP5 to address the lack of taxonomic information and expertise, and support implementation of the Convention's thematic and cross-cutting issues. At CoP6, the work program of the GTI was endorsed and emphasis was placed on the need to coordinate its implementation with existing initiatives, partnerships and institutions.

Capacity building at the national and regional levels was also emphasized. Parties were also urged to implement the program of work, and designate national focal points for the GTI, among others.

CBD Secretariat

The CBD Secretariat plays a pivotal role to the operations of the Convention. It plays a coordinating, advisory and servicing role in the working of the Convention. The Secretariat distributes information to the Parties mostly through meeting documents and Notifications. It is administered by UNEP and is located in Montreal, Canada.

Clearing House Mechanism

The Clearing House Mechanism (CHM) was established pursuant to Article 18 of the CBD to promote and facilitate technical and scientific cooperation.

Financial Mechanism

A financial mechanism was established pursuant to Article 21 of the CBD to provide financial resources to developing country Parties to meets its obligations under the Convention. The Global Environmental Facility (GEF) was appointed to operate the financial mechanism of the CBD. The GEF is managed by a Council composed of representatives from participating Parties. A GEF Secretariat provides administrative support. Projects of the GEF are undertaken by Parties and the Implementing Agencies of the GEF, namely: the United Nations Environment Program, United Nations Development Program, and the World Bank. In 1999, the GEF Council expanded opportunities for 7 organizations to contribute to the implementation of GEF projects. These include the African Development Bank (AfDB), Asian Development Bank (ADB), European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD), Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), UN Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) and the UN Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO). These organizations are known as Executing Agencies under the GEF's expanded opportunities policy.


III. Philippine Institutional Arrangements

CBD National Focal Points

The national agency responsible for implementing CBD in each country is called the National Focal Point. There are two national focal points for the CBD in the Philippines. The primary focal point is the Department of Foreign Affairs-United Nations and other International Organizations (DFA-UNIO), which by virtue of its mandate, is the primary link to the CBD in matters related to foreign commitments and official communications. The secondary focal point is the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), which by virtue of its mandate, is the office primarily in charge of scientific and technical matters in implementing the CBD.

SBSTTA and Clearing House Mechanism (CHM) National Focal Point

The DENR-PAWB serves as the focal point for the SBSTTA and CHM in the Philippines. A national framework for sharing biodiversity information has been adopted to facilitate the delivery and exchange of information on biodiversity and to support conservation efforts. A network of stakeholders and partners was established to achieve this objective (www.chm.ph).



PCSD-CCMRD Sub-Committee on Biodiversity

In 1992, Executive Order No. 15 was issued by then President Fidel V. Ramos creating a Philippine Council for Sustainable Development (PCSD) to "provide the mechanism for attaining the principles of sustainable development and assure its integration in the Philippine national polices, plans and programs that will involve all sectors of the society" and to manifest the country's adherence to the principles set forth in the Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. The PCSD was further strengthened through Executive Order No. 370 issued in 1996 to institutionalize the support of other key sectors of the society and to enhance coordination, planning and policy formulation, monitoring and evaluation of efforts to pursue sustainable development. Committees and sub-committees where appropriate, were created under the Council to correspond with the major areas of concern of the global Agenda 21. These Committees are the: (1) Committee on Social and Economic Dimensions (CSED); (2) Committee on Strengthening the Role of Major Groups (CSRMG); (3) Committee on Means of Implementation (CMI); and (4) Committee on Conservation and Management of Resources for Development (CCMRD).

Under the PCSD-CCMRD are 4 Sub-Committees: (1) Sub-Committee on Atmosphere; (2) Sub-Committee on Water Resources; (3) Sub-Committee on Land Resources; and, (4) Sub-Committee on Biodiversity (SCB). Among others, the SCB is responsible for providing scientific and other technical support to the National Focal Points of the CBD. It also serves as a venue for discussing relevant issues on biodiversity and a forum for formulating

Philippine positions on policies and programs on biodiversity agenda items for consideration in international meetings and conferences.

Below are the contact details of the National Focal Points and the PCSD-CCMRD-SCB. The SCB names and offices listed below are those listed in PCSD,1997. As of November 2005, some of the names and offices have been replaced, some names have transferred offices, or some offices have folded up.
