The Philippine NGO Sectors

Sustainable Agriculture / Organic Agriculture

Sustainable Agriculture has long been espoused by Philippine development organizations as the key towards genuine and sustainable economic growth for the Philippines. This is rooted from the common knowledge that the Philippines is primarily agricultural in nature and a great portion of the population, especially the poor depends on agricultural related activities for their subsistence. Over the years, this advocacy has formed and radiated to encompass its relevance to other issues such as poverty alleviation and food security. Other development sectors, especially a number of small-scale enterprises are also dependent on the agriculture sector being their source of raw materials.

Today, because of the growing concern for food safety, health and wellness, a new subsector surfaced – Organic Agriculture. Consumer preferences and their demand for a responsible guarantee of the food and things they buy, use, and consume have precursored the growth and development of this subsector. This also created new players in the sector, the Certification Bodies. NGOs and development organizations who in the beginning have advocated for sustainable agriculture also became the early adopters of organic agriculture.

While agriculture has long enjoyed the support of the government and other development agencies, farmers across the country together with the NGOs supporting smallholder farmers, feel that support is still very much needed in the areas of technology development, support infrastructure and facilities, input provisions (seedbanks, organic inputs, etc.) and trainings to harness not only skills in production but also in marketing and entrepreneurship.

Children

Safeguarding their basic human rights and ensuring that they grow up properly nurtured are the basic objectives of most NGOs dealing with children. Homes and shelters are usually operated by these organizations, where the children are taken in for proper healthcare and nourishment, and enjoy a safer growth environment or better living conditions. Similar to the youth-oriented organizations, children's rights advocates also explore ways by which a normal family environment can be eventually enjoyed by a child under their care. As such programs and activities that cater to parents and guardians are also carried out. For the children's needs, sponsorship is normally sought out by these organizations and in some cases, foster parents are tapped. For those that are dealing with victims of abuse, art therapy is often a staple component of their program and the shelter is normally not disclosed to the public. They also maintain a close relationship with the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).

Disaster Risk Reduction and Management

The Philippines is prone to natural disasters because of its geographic location and topography. Typhoons and earthquakes are normal occurrences in the country. Despite this reality, however, catastrophic events resulting from these natural hazards are still often experienced in the country. Disaster preparedness remains a major challenge in most parts of the country. Also a major worry among advocates of Disaster Risk Reduction and Management is the seeming vulnerability of Filipinos to the negative impacts of disasters brought about by the country's socio-economic and political conditions.

The Disaster Risk Reduction Network of the Philippines explains that in rural areas, disaster prone communities are often found in lowlands and coastal towns, while in urban sites, they can be found in crowded and depressed areas, using makeshift houses. These scenarios create high vulnerability as have already been seen during some recent typhoons where damage to property and death tolls were just catastrophic.

NGOs in this sector are currently lobbying for the passage of the Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Bill which calls on the government to put more focus on the people's preparedness to deal with these natural calamities.

Beyond campaigning for the Bill, DRRM NGOs are also implementing awareness and training programs and some engage in research activities to help develop appropriate measures and strategies to reduce the risk of disasters.

Differently-Abled

NGOs in this sector promote and protect the rights of persons with disabilities (PWDs) while working towards their economic and social integration. What these NGOs do is create an enabling environment for differently-abled individuals to conquer and overcome their physical limitations, so that in the end they realize within themselves that they have as much capability like able-bodied individuals to make significant contributions to the society. Skills training, education, and economic empowerment are some of the programs being carried out by these NGOs. They also provide homes and sometimes work environment that meet the special needs of these differently-abled. Activities geared towards building their confidence and self-esteem also form part of their intervention.

Elderly

NGOS working for the elderly are generally concerned in ensuring that the rights of senior citizens are protected and that their basic needs are provided. These NGOs also have programs aimed at making the elderlies feel that they can still make significant contributions to the society. They likewise have provisions for healthcare, counselling sessions and even skills trainings. As most NGOs in this sector cater primarily to poor Filipino elderlies or those that have been abandoned by their families, a home is

usually set up, where the elderly are taken in. These homes are accredited by the Department of Social Welfare and Development and their maintenance are ensured through grants, donations and sponsorships.

Education

NGOs in the education sector have programs aimed at facilitating access for children and the youth to enter formal educational institutions through the provision of scholarship grants and sponsorships or improving literacy through quality and relevant community-based literacy programs for out-of-school youths (OSYs) and adults.

A large number of these education oriented organizations, especially those that provide scholarship grants are registered as Foundations and are considered the social arm of an existing mainstream corporation. A pronounced objective of these organizations is the development of future leaders; hence leadership workshops and seminars are also part of their programs. In some cases, where the direct beneficiaries are children from poor and indigent families, programs are also developed for the parents to ensure that the schooling of the children are well supported by the families. Livelihood training programs or entrepreneurship seminars are sometimes carried out for the parents.

Environment

Environmental NGOs in the Philippines generally seek for development activities that do not compromise the integrity and sustainability of the natural environment. The continued degradation of the environment brought about by human activities and usually exploitative business processes are among the major concerns of these NGOs. There are varied types of NGOs under this sector, but in general, majority of environmental NGOs in the country are focused on the sustainable management of natural resources and in campaigning against policies and activities that threatens to bring immediate and long-term disturbance to the earth's ecological balance. Among NGOs exclusively advocating environmental causes, climate change is their big issue these days, and so is the overall impact of extractive industries such as mining. Among enterprises and manufacturers, green production and eco products are the current buzz words. In agriculture, organic and natural farming systems are gaining wide popularity giving manufacturers of pesticides and other synthetic agricultural inputs something to think about.

Good Governance / Transparency, Accountability /Anti-Corruption

NGOs pushing for good governance are generally focused in fighting public corruption. The Philippine government from the national down to the local units have always been embattled with corruption charges. For some NGOs, they see the problem to be deeply rooted within the system as it is not only present among public officials but the problem also goes down to ordinary government employees. Transparency and Accountability are being called for by NGOs working in this sector. Oftentimes, they engage the government in dialogues and proactively lay down their positions to the public on important

issues and policies where the government is expected to make a decision. In many ways, these NGOs are like watchdogs as to the decisions and actions being undertaken by the government especially in managing the resources of the country.

Health

Proper nutrition, population, reproductive and sexual health, are the current popular concerns of most health related NGOs. For some it is facilitating access to healthcare services among disadvantaged and marginalised groups done in the form of medical missions or the establishment or upgrading of health facilities. Lobbying and campaign activities are common among these NGOs as they actively push for more responsive government policies and programs on their issues. Trainings utilizing popular education methodologies are also carried out by these organizations to raise awareness on basic and relevant health issues. Feeding programs for children are also quite common.

Microfinance

Microfinance organizations cater mostly to the needs of micro and small enterprises with very limited means to grow their businesses and are not seen as attractive borrowers by formal banking institutions. The sector thrives well. According to a study on the “Global Microscope on the Microfinance Business Environment,” released in 2010, the Philippines is ranked second overall in having a good microfinance business environment compared with 54 other developing countries around the world.

There is a vibrant policy and regulatory environment for microfinance NGOs, as the government has called for their upgrading in the past, seeing their relevance in creating a more inclusive financial system which for so long has excluded a lot of Filipinos. Today, the government and the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas continuously seek ways to support this sector.

Common among Philippine Microfinance NGOs are the provisions of loan packages, coupled with a responsive support services. Micro and small enterprises that avail of the services of microfinance institutions usually get a lot of other assistance and support to ensure that they efficiently manage their loans. Apart from loan packages, some microfinance organizations also have small grant facilities which can be availed for non-commercial type activities.

MSMEs / Social Enterprises / Trade

The issue on sustainability has driven several NGOs to explore the potentials of setting up their own business units and engage in manufacturing and/or trading activities. The boom in social entrepreneurship in the country today, is also serving as an injunction to some NGOs and development organizations to develop new programmes and services that would cater to these growing number of social entrepreneurs. For organizations that want to focus on service delivery, they now have business development or enterprise development programs offered as a form of service to micro and small enterprises. These include: training services, trade or market facilitation, finance facilities, product

development, and the like. For those that ventured into direct manufacturing or production, they have evolved their own business enterprise units or created a subsidiary organization to focus only on the business side while retaining the NGO to focus on the advocacy or its social services.

The rise in the number of ethical consumers is also among the reasons, why venturing into a business became attractive to a lot of NGOs. These ethical consumers demand and patronize products made under socially, economically and environmentally responsible conditions. For NGOs, these conditions naturally fit their activities and programs; hence they very well know how to engage these consumers.

Because of the number of micro and small enterprises in the country today, comprising approximately 99% of all registered businesses, the market for NGOs offering enterprise or business development services is also huge. A lot of these micro and small enterprises are also consolidated into networks, associations or coalitions. An umbrella organization is common among micro and small enterprises of similar products, industry, location, function in the value chain, and advocacy thus making it easier for a service provider to create and offer customized services that will benefit a larger number of enterprises.

Government support is also well in place for enterprises through its various agencies like the DTI, DA, DOST, DOLE and many others. Programs on financing, product development, technology upgrading, training, market exposition, trade missions, promotions and the like are likewise available for Philippine MSMEs.

Peace Building

Pursuing peace in Mindanao has long been a struggle for the government and a number of NGOs and development oriented organizations operating in conflict-stricken parts of Mindanao. Reported causes of recurring violent clashes in the area have been attributed to a number of issues. NGOs pushing for lasting peace in Mindanao are heavily involved in consultations and dialogues that seek to determine ways on how to manage the conflict in the area. A lot of these NGOs have international affiliations and they actively network with each other thus forming some sort of a Peace Movement. The establishment of Peace Zones have largely been the initiative of these NGOs. Lately, there has also been a focus in supporting displaced communities with livelihood programs.

Women and Gender

Women's rights advocates in the country are generally pushing for more gender sensitive programs and policies and better recognition or more equitable appreciation on the roles women play and their contribution to society. Gender advocacy in the Philippines is heavily equated to women's rights, although a small percentage are already focusing on LGBTs. Programs related to women and gender, are primarily geared towards empowering organizations and individuals, using tools and standards developed by authorities and experts such as the United Nations and on the local front, the National Commission on Women (formerly NCRFW). For some NGOs, positive discrimination is exercised, which means there is preference for women as recipients or beneficiaries of programs and services. These

programs and services specifically catering to women are manifold as are the organizations implementing them. There are those that are into microfinance, enterprise development, shelter and provision of other basic needs to victims of abuse, reproductive health, motherhood and child rearing, education among others. Some organizations, on the other hand, provide training and organizational development services that focus on improving policies and more gender-sensitive staff and organizational culture. Today, women and gender is essentially an inherent part of the advocacy of most Philippine NGOs as most funding agencies require for the inclusion of gender-related activities in the funding proposals submitted to them. Project contracts between funders and NGOs are also laden with provisions related to gender, especially on impact to women.

Urban Poor

NGOs focusing on urban poor primarily cater to the issues besetting slum dwellers and squatters mostly located in Metro Manila and its nearby areas and in other populous metropolitan areas like Cebu. Majority of the urban poor population are informal settlers who migrated to the city from the rural areas seeking for better opportunities. For urban poor NGOs, they are faced with a long list of problems which include lack of access to basic services, insecurity, livelihood, health and sanitation, population control among others. The primary thrust of these NGOs is to help secure and fight for the rights of these urban poor as well as create an enabling environment for them to have better quality of life. For the government, relocation and low cost-housing have been the most pronounced response to the plight of the urban poor, which according to some NGOs is not enough as there are many other needs that also have to be addressed. One such problem is their source of income, for without it they are sometimes forced to resort to illegal activities or outright begging on the streets. Their children too are sometimes used to generate income for the family as some of them can be seen peddling leis and rags on the streets even at odd hours at night or are seen skirting around the premises of malls and restaurants begging for food or money. Without a decent source of income, urban poor families are often unable to afford to send children to school or consistently enjoy three full meals a day.

Youth

The focus of youth-oriented development organizations are usually the Out-of-School Youths (OSYs) because of their vulnerabilities to abuse, negative peer pressure and vices. Programs catering to them usually straddle along the lines of properly equipping them with skills and imbuing in them good values that will make them aspire and live better and more responsible lives as adults. Some organizations provide scholarships to formal education, while others develop their own in-house training and education programs which they implement in their respective facilities, especially if they are dealing with victims of abuse. Programs and activities are also carried out for parents and guardians, as the hope of most of these youth-oriented NGOs is to as much as possible have the young ones be nurtured within the confines of a natural family environment. Allied programs provided to parents and guardians

include skills training so they can engage in sustainable livelihood activities, work placement and in some cases, counselling. Staffs of these organizations are normally licensed social workers or counsellors and the organization itself is usually accredited or is a partner of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD).
