


INTERNATIONAL MIGRATION

- 1 out of 35 persons in the world is an international migrant
- Philippines' stop gap measure in 1970s
- Brought about by construction boom in the Middle East

2006 ESTIMATED NUMBER OF FILIPINOS OVERSEAS





50% of victims are assisted by smugglers or traffickers


> 600,000-800,000 women and children are trafficked each year

GLOBAL FIGURES ON HUMAN SMUGGLING AND TRAFFICKING

- > 80% of cross-border trafficked persons are women
- > 70% are absorbed by the sex industry
- > 50% of victims are from South and Southeast Asia
- 8,000 women and girls trafficked from the Philippines






NUMBER OF SPOUSES / OTHER PARTNERS OF FOREIGN NATIONALS (1989-2006)






FILIPINOS IN INTERMARRIAGES

MODE OF INTRODUCTION (June 1989-2006)







1 – Zamboanga City (November 29, 2005)

3 persons sentenced to life imprisonment and pay Php 2M in fines for violation of Sec. 4 in rel. to Sec. 6 (c) and 10 (c) (Qualified Trafficking)

4 – Quezon City (December 8, 2005)


Spouses sentenced to 4 life imprisonment and pay Php 8M in fines for violation of Sec. 4 in rel. to Sec 6 (a) and (c) (Qualified Trafficking)

2 – Batangas City (November 15 & 28)

2 persons sentenced to render 6 months of community service for pleading guilty to Sec. 11(Use of Trafficked Persons)

2006 REPORT OF THE U.S. GOVERNMENT

The Philippine Experience:

"Tier 2...removed from the Watchlist...the government does not fully comply with the minimum standards for the elimination of trafficking; however, it is making significant efforts to do so..."

REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9208

Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act of 2003

- 1.) Considers trafficked persons as victims rather than offenders
- 2.) Punishes use of trafficked victims
- 3.) Recognizes the right to privacy of trafficked persons during investigation, prosecution and trial
- 4.) Gives trafficked persons preferential entitlement under the government's Witness Protection Program



REPUBLIC ACT NO. 9208

Anti-Trafficking in Persons Act of 2003

- 5.) Provides protection and assistance to trafficked persons who are also foreign nationals
- 6.) Mandates government agencies to establish and implement preventive, protective and rehabilitative programs for trafficked persons
- 7.) Establishes a trust fund to be used exclusively for prevention, protection, rehabilitation and reintegration programs



PRESIDENTIAL TASK FORCE AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- 1.) Recommend to IACAT policies, programs and services to enhance government initiatives against trafficking in persons
- 2.) Conduct surveillance and entrapment operations of persons, firms or entities alleged or suspected to be engaged in trafficking and related activities
- 3.) Cause or direct the immediate apprehension, investigation and speedy prosecution of cases



PRESIDENTIAL TASK FORCE AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- 4.) Provide adequate legal, psycho-social and other forms of assistance to trafficked persons, subject to rules and regulations
- 5.) Consolidate various data and statistics on trafficking, and establish comprehensive databank for monitoring, documentation and prosecution of trafficking incidents
- 6.) Conduct a community education and information campaign program



SUPPORT PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

- 1. Legal Assistance Fund
- 2. Assistance-To-Nationals Fund
- 3. Filipino Workers Resource Centers
- 4. Repatriation Programs for Trafficked Persons
- 5. Crisis Intervention Units
- 6. DSWD Safety Houses and Shelters/Centers
- 7. Project HAVEN



RECOVERY

- a. Safe and adequate shelter for victims regardless of immigration status
- b. Access to primary healthcare and counseling
- c. Provision of legal and other assistance in connection with criminal, civil and other action against trafficking



REPATRIATION

- a. Representations with host countries to ensure safe, orderly and possibly, voluntary return of victims
- b. Explore option of residency for victims either in host or third country resettlement
- c. Facilitate and accept return of its nationals who are victims of trafficking, with due regards to safety



REINTEGRATION

- a. Provision of assistance and support to facilitate social integration and prevent revictimization
- b. Encourage and support community and family-based reintegration programs
- c. Support local government units in building their shelters, cooperatives, and livelihood and skills training



IN GENERAL

- a. Ratify U.N. instruments on transnational crimes, trafficking and smuggling
- b. Strengthen international coordination on:
 - establishing central database
 - adopting uniform and standard reporting format
 - institutionalization of responsive network
 - mainstreaming trafficking issues
 - setting up monitoring and feedback mechanisms



IN GENERAL

- c. Strengthening criminal justice system especially children's desks, and family and juvenile courts
- d. Cooperation with other countries for more bilateral, regional and international agreements
- e. Build partnerships with all stakeholders including NGOs, communities, private sector and civil society
